

JOHNSTON REPORTS ON MEETING

MYER DENIES GROUNDFLESS RUMORS

Upon return from the meeting of project directors recently held in Denver, Colo., it was reported by Project Director Ray D. Johnston that there was absolutely no definite information concerning opening up of the West Coast for the return of all evacuees. He pointed out that the WRA and various other agencies are still working toward this and are very hopeful that the West Coast will be opened up, but there is no indication as to how soon this might be expected.

Johnston pointed out that all evacuees have the privilege, if they so desire, to apply to the Commanding General of the Western Defense Command for blank forms in order to make application for return to the West Coast. Several residents of Rohwer have made such applications during the past several months, but none have been approved by the Command to date.

Various rumors which are now current in all the relocation centers were reported by the various project directors, but the National Director, Dillon Myer, stated that all such rumors were groundless.

SATOW STRESSES LIFE WITH FUTURE OUTSIDE

Public acceptance of evacuee resettlers is on the whole favorable, congenial atmosphere being created chiefly by the Nisei's own mental attitude to be just another American, stated Masao Satow of the YMCA National Council program staff who is making his third trip to Roh-

wer this week.

Residents See Service for 5

On an outdoor stage banked by wreaths of flowers, hundreds of residents, young and old, paid their respects Sunday to five Nisei soldiers who fell on the battlefields of Italy.

Eddie Omori, himself a veteran of World War I, presided over the Memorial Service; 3 volleys fired by a special group shattered the silence. The Service ended as Boy Scout bugles sounded and re-echoed taps.

The youths honored were Sgt. Togo Sugiyama, Sgt. Akira Shimatsu, Pfc. Calvin Saito, Sgt. Zenichi Masuda and T/Sgt. Ted T. Tanobyo.

Emphasizing that for Japanese Americans life with a future is on the outside, Satow cited examples of public reactions where citizens of various communities have voiced unanimous indignation over any prejudices against evacuee newcomers. And the Nisei can show their gratitude to those who understand, individuals, groups and the newspapers, by writing letters of appreciation.

"The last words of Uncle Sam's Nisei soldiers dying in action have invariably been their hopes that they have made it possible for their loved ones to be able to live happily," Satow said, while describing the spontaneous acclamation which stormed a theater as it showed the newsreel of the famed 100th Battalion receiving the Presidential Citation.

Satow, whose special assignment is to serve the West Coast evacuees, both in the relocation centers and on the outside, reports

I've written on the subject before, but I feel it necessary to bring the matter up again. It's about the fast eating in our mess hall.

Following my previous article, earlier in the year, conditions improved perceptibly. People took a little more time at their meals.

Dishwashers showed more patience with slow eaters, and waitresses desisted from giving them dirty looks.

Teachers even devoted a class session or two to discussing the importance of eating slowly and chewing well.

It looked as if the people, at long last, were finally getting hep to the folly of gulping their food down and racing thru their meals. When I left on my three-month jaunt in late June, it seemed that my "More Time at Mealtime" campaign had made considerable headway.

But after my return, alas and alack, I found that the people had reverted to their former ways. They were bolting their food down with all their old-time speed and recklessness.

Now I admit that it's none of my blinking business. If the people want to swallow their food and ruin their health, that's their worry.

But being a humane sort of guy, I think that it's only fair to give them some sort of inkling as to the tragic consequences that will result.

The other day a friend of mine in Cleveland went to see a doctor. For several weeks, he had been bothered with a strange whirring sound in the region of his stomach, accompanied occasionally with what sounded like the meshing of gears.

A careful stethoscopic examination disclosed that something revolutionary

Under the plan the family would live together in the hostel at a moderate cost per day until adequate housing is found.

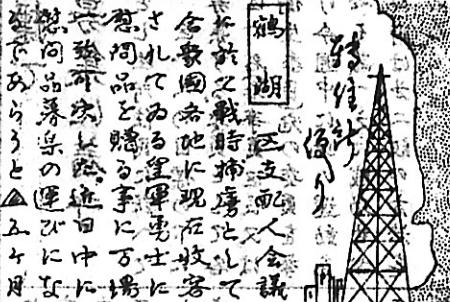
