

COUNCIL SETS NEW RULES FOR OUTSIDE PASS

The Community Council released a new set of rules regarding the securing of day passes to the outside, effective Oct. 2.

The new procedure to leave the Center follows:

1. An applicant of the day pass must see the head of the section or unit, under whom he is working, and get a complete leave application, or a statement that such an individual has a "day off" due to a special work schedule. He must be validated with the signature of the head.

2. Have 3 copies made (1 original and 2 copies), take the 3 copies to the Personnel Management Section, have them validated by Ed Bethune, and retain the third copy.

OCHIKUBO CASIE MISSINTERPRETED

Recent discussions in a number of project papers of the injunction suit filed by Dr. George Ochikubo to prevent interference with his proposed return to the West Coast military area, have included a misleading inference that should the case be tried in court its outcome will determine the rights of Misce in general.

This, Project Attorney S. Forrest pointed out,

is an erroneous interpretation of the facts. The Army has revoked the applicability of the mass exclusion order as far as Dr. Ochikubo is concerned and has issued to him an individual exclusion order. Decision in his case will therefore pertain to him alone, and will not decide the question of return to the West Coast of other evacuees, either individually or as a group.

Pfc. Higa has been welcomed in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Utah, Colorado, Nebraska, Wyoming, New Mexico and Arizona. He is also expected to appear in Chicago, Fort Snelling, Minneapolis, Ann Arbor, Detroit, Cincinnati and Cleveland, before proceeding to the East.

When Kenji Okuda, past president of the Oberlin College student body who is making a speaking tour under the Fellowship of Reconciliation, visited Rohwer last week, he expressed surprise at the local Nisei's apparent lack of response, either from backwardness or disinterestedness.

Comparing the reactions of young audience on the outside and in the Center, he elucidated that after a speech some members of any outside group of listeners would always approach him for a word or two, whereas the local audience headed in toto forth the exit. He expressed his admiration for a young listener who would speak up and present his questions or opinions, irrational as they may be, accrediting him with active interest and courage to learn.

Okuda, who spoke at the Rohwer high school and Buddhist and Christian churches, left Wednesday for Oklahoma to continue his speaking tour.

NEW CASUALTIES NISEI LOYALTY.

AMONG THE 10,000 Japanese Americans serving along American soldiers of Japanese ancestry fighting in Italy and in the Pacific theaters of action emphasize the necessity of distinguishing between our Japanese enemies and those Japanese Americans who are loyal citizens or law-abiding aliens, Harold S. Fistero, relocation supervisor of the War Relocation Authority for the mid-Atlantic States, told the Kiwanis Club of New York City at a luncheon meeting on Sept.

13 at the Hotel McAlpin.

Among the 10,000 Japanese American soldiers are hundreds engaged in the Pacific theaters of action in the war against Japan, Fistero said. He added that American casualty lists have already included the names of hundreds of Americans of Japanese descent who have been killed or wounded, principally in Italy.

The casualties have included numerous boys whose parents are among the 60,000 persons of Japanese ancestry evacuated from the West Coast who are still residing at the 8 relocation centers operated by the War Relocation Authority, according to Fistero. Other casualties have been boys whose families were included among the 6,000 persons of Japanese origin who have already resettled with the aid of WRA, principally in Eastern and Mid-Western communities.

"As we get closer to victory over Germany and therefore closer to the final showdown with Japan, it will become increasingly more important for Americans on the homefront to draw a clear distinction between our Japanese enemies in the Far East and the loyal citizens and law-abiding aliens of Japanese ancestry in our own country," Fistero said.

STRESS FISTERE

WORLD WAR II is essential in fairness to the parents and other relatives of the Japanese American boys whose names are appearing with ever greater frequency on the casualty lists from Italy and other battlefronts. Just the other day it was announced that among the Americans recently killed in Italy were 48 soldiers of Japanese ancestry with parents or next of kin living in relocation centers. In addition, 92 others have been wounded and two are missing in action. "All these boys were members of the 100th Infantry Battalion, composed of Japanese Americans, to which Lieut. General Mark W. Clark a few weeks ago awarded a special Presidential citation for 'outstanding performance of duty in action.' In this citation General Clark said that 'the fortitude and intrepidity displayed by the officers and men of the 100th Infantry Battalion reflect the finest traditions of the Army of the United States.'

"Hundreds of other American citizens of Japanese descent have performed, and are continuing to perform, invaluable services in the Pacific theaters of action in the war against Japan, earning the commendation of their commanding officers for loyalty and efficiency."

3. Get the gate pass from the clock manager as before. When leaving the gate, give the gate pass and validated leave application to the gate clerk at the Internal Security office.

4. Gate passes for those who are not employed must be indicated as "Not employed". This is done in the following manner: at the time the applicant applies for a gate pass at the clock manager's office, the manager writes "not employed" after the name of the applicant. The same indication will then be made on the gate pass. If not thus indicated, see Miss Miller, secretary of Project Director Ray D. Johnston.
