OWENS TOURS WEST COAST

Evacuee Property Officer E. F. Owens returned Saturday from a recently conducted three-week inspection tour of the West Coast where he investigated conditions of evacuee property in San Francisco, Sacramento, Fresno, Stockton and Los Angeles.

He found property stored in government warehouse in excellent conditions at each locality. He also visited farms, stores and dwellings owned by evacuees.

"I would discourage the shipping of property from the West Coast to the project. They will be better cared for in the warehouses than if shipped," he said.

"I suggest that people with property in garages or cheap building have them placed in government warehouses."

EVACUEE OPENS LAW OFFICE IN CHICAGO

Chicago, Ill.--Thomas Masuda, who is believed to be the first resettler to be admitted to the practice of law in Illinois, has opened his own offices in the Metropolitan Building in Chicago. He was admitted to the Illinois bar on Sept. 18, 1944, without an examination on the basis of his excellent record on the West Coast.

Masuda is a graduate of the University of Washington Law School and practiced law in Seattle for many years. He is a member of the American Bar Association.

CAD'NCE DEPOT REPORT MADE

Young Orsburn, Sam Se-no, and Teruji Endow, representatives from Rohwer Center, who recently investigated the Sioux Ordnance Depot, reported their findings.

400 Issei and Nisei workers are desired to load and unload all types of munitions under Civil Service. With a 48 hour week wages are 72¢ an hour, time and a half after 40 hours. The work, safety ensured, is mostly mechanical and not too heavy. The plant is located on 2000 acres with a set-up similar to Seabrook Farms. Functioning for two years it already employs 800. Only family groups are wanted. Jobs are available for both men and women.

Recruiters from the Sioux Ordnance Depot near Sidney, Neb., Capt. George Figner, depot personnel director, Charles B. Miller, Denver relocation supervisor, and Cecil Morgan, relocation officer of Scottsbluff, Neb., arrived here today. They were accompanied by Jessie Lewis of Little Rock WRA.

Some 400 to 500 workers from Heart Mountain, Minidoka and Rohwer are sought. Sign-ups will be a two-week process. The trio will be here possibly a week to start the program filling out Provost Marshall clearances and Civil Service Form #60. Family heads who have already relocated may be recruited by their local WRA office while any other family member, not relocated, may register in the Center. The recruiters may be contacted in the Leave office.

JACL REPORTS:

SUPREME COURT TO HEAR KOREMATSU, ENDO CASES

New York City, N. Y., Oct. 4--The United States Supreme Court will hear the Korematsu and Endo cases on Wednesday and Thursday from present indications. The first case on the calendar will be the Korematsu case which will decide the question whether the mass evacuation from the Pacific Coast of all persons of Japanese parentage was constitutional or not. The arguments are expected to start on Wednesday afternoon, according to the JACL press release.

The Endo case which will define the authority of the War Relocation Authority over citizens of Japanese ancestry who are now living in the relocation cen-

ters will be argued right after, most likely on Thursday morning.

Mr. Wayne Collins of the Northern California branch of the American Civil Liberties Union is expected to argue the Korematsu case. Mr. James Purcell of San Francisco is expected to argue the Endo case. Mr. Charles Horsky of Washington, D.C., ACLU member, most likely will be allotted some time to argue both cases.

These two test cases, according to the statement of Mr. Roger N. Baldwin, director of the ACLU, are the two most important cases pertaining to civil liberties to arise during World War I and World War II.

LT. COL. SINGLES PAYS TRIBUTE TO 100th BN.

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--High tribute was paid to the fighting soldiers of the Japanese American 100th Infantry Battalion by their battalion commander, Lieut. Col. Gordon Singles, a West Point graduate.

"There are countless instances of battlefield heroism by these infantrymen fighting on the Fifth Army front," he said. "They have plenty of guts, and aren't afraid to use their initiative during attacks. They've fought their way over endless mountains in Italy since last September. They have captured towns from Germans without assistance of other units. Recently they captured a German command post, complete with a large motor pool and an entire field-artillery battery, all intact."

Italian towns recently captured by the 100th Battalion are: Belvedere, Sassetta, Pastina, and Orsiana. Belvedere was taken by a surprise thrust, Sassetta by a flanking attack, Pastina by a frontal attack, and Orsiana bypassed and then completely surrounded.

A small gathering followed the strong teams to the last remaining seconds when Yas Chono of the GIs broke the taut 0-0 score. An extra treat was a group of young majorettes who twirled their batons between halves.

FIRST QUARTER

Blue Devil Junji Sasaki kicked off. The ball was received and carried by GI Jim Tsukamoto from the 20-yard line to the middle strip where he was

tackled and thrown. The GIs made 3 consecutive first and tens, the mighty Blue Devils were unable to hold the GIs back as they made 3 consecutive first tens. The GIs on the Blue Devils' thirty came out of the huddle and the ball was snapped. No gain was made though the full-back pounded into the line.
