DEPOT INVESTIGATED

SENO SUMMARIZES CONDITIONS

Sam Seno, one of the investigators of Sioux Depot from Rohwer, will publish a series of articles on the ordnance plant at Sidney, Neb. The first follows:

Ordville, the housing set up by the F.P.H.A., is located adjacent to the Sioux Ordnance Depot. It is supervised by a capable Mr. Saunders who is attentively managing the area.

In appearance, Ordville reminds one of a well kept

village. Grass is planted on all grounds not used for street. A solid section is being set aside for the Japanese residents with a nearby plot of farming ground available for all victory garden enthusiasts. Irrigation is furnished by the Depot facilities.

An unfurnished apartment is provided with a coal burning range, electric refrigerator, lights, water, and garbage service. Coal can be bought for \$9. a ton and kindling wood for \$2 a truck load. Rates on apartments are as follows:

CHANCE JEROME INTO PW CAMP

Arkansas Gazette, Oct. 8--The Jerome Relocation Center, closed in July when its Japanese occupants were moved to other centers, will become a prisoner of war camp. A. L. Anderson, public relations officer for the United States Engineers, Little Rock district, announced yesterday that a contract for a perimeter fence around the barracks area, had been awarded to the Robertson Fence Co. of Cincinnati.

The camp, formerly housing 8,000 Japanese, was under the War Relocation Authority originally, but as a prisoner of war camp, it will be operated under the Office of the Provost Marshal General.
