ROHWER CASUALTY REPORT

Twelve Mead casualties-- 2 killed, 2 missing in action, 6 seriously wounded, and 2 slightly wounded-- were reported this week.

Mr. and Mrs. Sensuke Nakamura have been informed of the death of their son, Cpl. George S. Nakamura, in France on Oct. 29. The Nakamuras, formerly of Al Campo, lives at 23-9-A.

S/SGT. SENZAKI LEADS RESCUE

S/Sgt. Tak Senzaki, formerly of this Center, was disclosed to have commanded the platoon which was the first to reach the "lost battalion" of the 36th (Tex.) Division behind the German lines in France.

The 22-year-old former local fireman, who volunteered from the Center early last year, and two members of his platoon were the first to reach the encircled infantrymen.

Seventh Army spokesmen revealed that the rescue was effected when the fighting 442nd crashed through a German road block near Vosges Hill after bitter fighting.

For five days the Texans had been without food until rations and medical supplies were dropped by low-flying Thunderbolts, and they had all but given up hope.

On the seventh day of the "lost battalion's" isolation, Second Lieut. Erwin Blonder had remarked, "I'll bet the 442nd is the first to reach us. I'd give \$1,000 to see a Jap come through the woods now."

Late the next day, on the afternoon of Oct. 30th, the Japanese Americans broke through the Nazi lines and rescued the trapped soldiers.

Former San Pedroan Pfc. George Omokawa succumbed on Oct. 30, according to a telegram received by his cousin, Sue Omokawa, of 29-9-F.

Reported missing in action was Pfc. Harry N. Kuroiwa on Oct. 19. Kuroiwa's wife, Kiyo, and his baby daughter live at 25-9-C while his parents are

rating the 442nd as their favorite regiment, and a strong move was under way to declare them all honorary Texans.

In a letter to a friend here dated Oct. 26, just four days before the rescue, Sgt. Senzaki wrote that he had a "close call" recently while on a patrol behind enemy lines.

"Every which way we turned, jerrics jumped us. But we managed to get back after fighting it out three times," he related. Senzaki revealed that his helmet was creased by a machine gun bullet in one of the skirmishes.

Sgt. Senzaki's mother, Mrs. Yasu Senzaki, lives at 5-8-B here.

Pfc. Frank I. Mizufuka, from Whittier, sustained a serious wound on Oct. 21 the War Department informed parents, Mr. and Mrs. Isaburo Mizufuka of 13-9-A. Mizufuka has a brother in the Enlisted Reserve, another relocated and a younger brother and sister in the Center.

Mr. Yakumatsu Kishi, 27-5-B, has been notified that his son, Pfc. Robert T. Kishi, was seriously wounded on Oct. 26. Kishi's pre-evacuation address was Stockton.

Notified of the serious wound of Terminal Islander, Cpl. Misao Sakauye, were his brother Masaharu, 12-1-D, and his mother, Mrs. Haru Sakauye.

A volunteer for service eight days after Pearl Harbor, Cpl. Robert Seiki Fujita was seriously wounded. From Los Angeles, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Manuemon Fujita, live at 4-6-D.

Pfc. Kay K. Masaoka of Gardena received a wound on Oct. 20 learned his sister-in-law, Mrs. Chiyeo Masaoka, 2-7-B. Masaoka whose parents are in Japan has three brothers also in service.

Slightly wounded on Oct. 28 was T/Sgt. Masakazu Nishi of Hanford. Parents, Mr. and Mrs. Masajiro Nishi are of 10-10-F.

S/Sgt. Frank K. Yamasaki was slightly wounded on Oct. 23. His mother and sister are both residents of Blk. 14. Yamasaki was from Norwalk.

SILVER STAR AWARDED CORPORAL POSTHUMOUSLY

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--For gallantry in action on the Fifth Army front in Italy, Cpl. Yoshiharu N. Aoyama, an infantryman of the Japanese American 442nd Regimental Combat Team, was recently awarded the Silver Star posthumously.

Though both his legs had been blown off when he went to the rescue of a wounded companion, Aoyama refused medical attention and insisted, "I'm all right. The others need help more than I do. Treat them first."

His citation read in part, "The extreme physical and moral courage of Corporal Aoyama and his concern for his fellow comrades when himself mortally wounded reflect the highest traditions of the military service."

Aoyama volunteered for service with the 442nd.

He sold fruit in Los Angeles, California, before he and his family evacuated from their home at 131 East Second Street, Los Angeles, to Heart Mountain Center. He majored in chemistry for three years at the University of California at Los Angeles.
