Workers to Aid in Emergencies

Project Director Ray D. Johnston has advised all appointed personnel and evacuee workers that they are subject to be called to assume any duty assigned during any emergency such as fires, accidents or disturbances.

This action was taken in order to protect workers in event of injury while performing an emergency duty not provided for in their job descriptions. It is believed that this action will afford workers protection, insofar as they are not entitled to the benefits of the U. S. Employees Compensation Act while performing duties not regularly assigned.

Project Director Johnston has sent memoranda to all WRA evacuee employees.

Elizabeth Humbarger of Stockton, friend to many former Japanese residents of Stockton, wrote recently expressing her regret that she has found practically no items in the Stockton Record concerning the Japanese Americans serving in the armed forces. Therefore, the people of Stockton have little idea of what the Nisei are doing.

Miss Humbarger asks that parents take names, addresses and, if possible, pictures of their sons in service to their USO block representatives. The representatives in turn will send the information to Miss Humbarger.

Miss Humbarger has been very kind in her consideration of problems of her Nisei friends.

COMMITTEE TO GIVE SERVICES TO NEW YORK CITY NEWCOMERS

Resettlers arriving in New York City will be met at Grand Central Station or Pennsylvania Terminal and escorted to their destination by members of a reception committee recently organized by the Resettlement Council of the Japanese American Organizations of New York City if the New York relocation office has been given advance notice of the time and place of arrival.

According to E. Price Steidling, relocation offi-

cer in charge of the New York district office, the reception committee consisting of local residents of Japanese ancestry, has been especially helpful to Issei and several family groups that have arrived in New York in recent weeks. The committee will be glad to meet newcomers at the railroad terminals and escort them to the local hotel or other destination if they will notify the WRA office, while on route, of the exact time and place of their train's arrival.

The New York Resettlement Council includes representatives of the following institutions and organizations: New York Buddhist Church, Japanese Christian Association, Japanese Christian Institute, Japanese Methodist Church, Japanese American Young People's Christian Federation of New York, Japanese American Committee for Democracy, and the New York chapter of the Japanese American Citizen's League.

Steidling said that resettlers can transmit information regarding their travel plans in a "tour-rate" telegram from any point within the United States to any other point at a cost of only 44 cents for 15 words. Other information may be included in a Tour-Rate Telegram provided it relates to one's time of departure or arrival, to weather conditions, or to both. An evacuee sending such a message should state that it is to be sent as a Tour-Rate Telegram.

PARCEL MAIL

The Post Office has announced the following in regard to mailing packages by parcel post:

Sealed packages sent parcel post without the parcel post labels, "Merchandise may be opened for inspection," require first class postage which is three cents per ounce. Do not seal parcels unless they are intended for first class.


