PROCEDURE FOR COAST RETURN

Coordinator E. B. Moulton announced that if an alien whose relocation plan has been approved by the WRA wishes to relocate in the Pacific Coastal Zone, his travel permit will now be issued by the Project director. If he wishes to go to the Pacific Coastal Zone without a WRA approved plan, his permit must be issued by the United States District Attorney at Little Rock.

CENTER VISITS MUST BE APPROVED

New Years Not Center Holiday

Ray D. Johnston, project director, has announced that New Year's Day will not be a holiday for anyone at this Center. Those not working on New Year's will be required to request vacation leave in advance through their supervisors.

If a person does not have as much as one day's leave accumulated and is absent from work, he will be charged with one day's leave without pay.

BRONZE STAR AWARDED S/SGT.

According to a War Department announcement, dated Dec. 9, Staff Sgt. Frank J. Yamasaki, formerly of Norwalk, Calif., has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal.

A travel permit must be approved by the District Attorney for that area. A travel permit will be issued by the project director in every case, whether there is an approved plan or not, where an alien's destination is outside the Pacific Coastal Zone.

E. B. Moulton requested that all Center residents notify relatives and friends who have relocated on indefinite leave, that visits to this Center after Jan. 2 must be approved by the Relocation officer having jurisdiction over the area in which they are now living.

This will also apply to persons on trial indefinite leave who have been outside the Center less than four months or more than six months. Those on short term leave will be permitted to return as they have in the past.

According to recent instructions, people on indefinite leave who return to the Center after Jan. 2 without the approval of the Relocation officer in their area may be denied admittance by the project director.

Moulton pointed out that it is highly important that all relocated persons be advised of this fact in order to avoid complications if they should return here.

TO ASSIST IN POLICY PROB.

Just three years ago we were living in the cities and farms and Little Tokios on the Pacific coast. It was a pretty dreary New Year's, we were preparing to celebrate then.

Japan had attacked Pearl Harbor three weeks before, and the 115,000 Japanese Americans on the Coast faced a year of doubt and uncertainty.

Today, with the bitter experiences and the heart-aches of the evacuation behind us, we stand on the threshold of a New Year and a new life for us.

We are again free to return to the West Coast and enjoy the rights, privileges, and liberties that are the precious heritage of all good Americans.

This restoration of our rights, however, has not come about without a struggle. The battle has been hard and, at times, discouraging. But we have been vindicated.

For that, we can thank ourselves, the War Relocation Authority, the churches of America, and all of our friends who have fought so faithfully for us.

But mostly, we can thank the fighting Algei Doughboys of the 100th Battalion and 442nd Regiment, who are acquitting themselves so nobly on the battle-swept terrains of Italy and France.

These gallant boys are the ones who are paving the way for our return to California. They are paying the price for us--in blood and with their young lives.

The rest of the job is up to us. We must see to it that we do not let them down and that these boys have not died in vain.

Let no one of us, by action or words or sins of omission, jeopardize our regained status that has been so dearly bought.

No one knows what the future holds for us. But this much we do know: It is our turn to carry the ball, and we must not fumble it.

Let the watchword in 1945 for us all be:

"Forward in '45!" B. T.

MEMPHIS PAPER RUNS FAVORABLE EDITORIAL TIKES THINKS MANY WILL NOT RETURN TO CAL.

The Memphis Commercial Appeal ran the following editorial on Dec. 27 expressing opinions on the evacuees and the lifting of the West Coast exclusion.

"Not until public sentiment has had opportunity to crystallize will it be known how the Pacific Coast areas view War Department revocation of its 1942 order barring all persons of Japanese ancestry and permitting them, after Jan. 2, the same freedom of movement enjoyed by other citizens and friendly aliens.

"That the return of those of Japanese ancestry will meet with some opposition is expected, and has already been indicated, but in the main the people of the Pacific Coast will probably measure up to the War Department's belief that they will accord to the returning evacuees "all the consideration to which they are entitled as loyal citizens and law-abiding residents."

"That such consideration has been earned is without challenge. Large numbers are bona fide Americans, and as such are entitled to the same constitutional rights and privileges as any other citizen. Many are property holders, and most have been well-behaved and co-operative during the exclusion period.

In the latter state (Ark.) two centers, one at Jerome and the other at Rohwer, were maintained, but only the Rohwer center is now being used. Both have functioned without disturbing the way of life hereabouts, and no untoward incident came of their existence.

"A considerable number among those originally held at relocation centers, have long since taken advantage of opportunities to find jobs elsewhere, and in only one or two instances has there been betrayal of the trust imposed. The majority, it seems, have welcomed the opportunity to prove their loyalty.

"The record of Japanese-American soldiers in combat, both in Italy and

Many Send Xmas Gifts to Center

Christmas gifts from many sources were received joyously by Center children 17 years of age and under on Christmas Eve.

Last of the gifts poured in last week from 24 different states. Prominent states were New York and New Jersey.

200 boxes of packages and 25 monetary donations were received, according to Mrs. Muraoka of CA.

Lists of contributors--church service organizations, Caucasian and Nisei individuals--will be posted on all mess hall bulletin boards.

Western Europe, speaks for itself. It is exceptional in valor and efficiency. They had to prove themselves, and they have done it so well that their staunchest supporters and friends are found among other American elements which fought with or near them. In the same edition of the Commercial Appeal in which the War Department's revocation order was announced, there appeared a news report of the battlefield commissioning of a Japanese-American staff sergeant whose parents are at the Rohwer center. Several days ago, Memphis newspapers published a list of 21 Japanese-American soldier casualties, of whom eight had been killed in action. The next of kin of each lives at Rohwer.

"The behavior of the evacuees as a whole, along with the record of Japanese-American combat organizations, cannot be discounted by this country in determining what the attitude should be toward those soon to be leaving relocation centers. Least of all can the constitutional rights of bona fide citizens be ignored.

"Their recession will create no problems which cannot be solved if dealt with by intelligence and patience."

Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Ickes expressed a belief on Dec. 20, that most of the 33,000 Japanese American and Japanese alien civilians who have relocated throughout the country "will choose of their own accord to remain in their present locations."

"They will want to stay on their war jobs and to make the most of their new opportunities among friends and neighbors," he said.

The Secretary also commended both the evacuees who had left the centers to relocate and the civic-minded individuals and organizations in hundreds of communities that have aided them to begin new lives. Evacuees have resettled in 47 states and the District of Columbia, with none reporting to date from South Carolina. Those returning past months to the exclusion area comprising California and parts of Oregon, Washington and Arizona, have done so under military permits issued by the Western Defense Command.

Secretary Ickes said that in addition to the 35,000 who have left war relocation centers since 1942 to work in cities, towns and rural areas throughout the country, 2,000 other Japanese Americans went from War Relocation Authority projects into active Army service. More than one-third of these were volunteers.

"The civilian relocatees have been contributing fully to successful prosecution of the war," the Secretary said. They have worked hard at war production jobs and in related war supporting employment. Many of them have sons, husbands and brothers in the Army, and some of these young American soldiers have been killed in action.

"Resettlement of those in the centers to all parts of the country will be carried on with greater intensity in the weeks and months ahead. It will take place in an orderly manner and with the objectives in mind that the evacuees shall relocate wherever they wish, and where they can find the best opportunity to lead useful lives."
