### Study Own Problems Says JACL

Both Issei and Nisei were advised by JACL national headquarters to carefully study their own problems before making any move to return to the Pacific Coast.

As far as Nisei who are still within the draft age are concerned, it was stated that they should not return to their homes without clearing their status with the local draft board. If they are in essential work

and return without obtaining releases from their employer, they will not be able to obtain new employment to qualify for deferment. Under such cases, the local boards would have the right to immediately induct them into the armed forces.

The Issei must remember that the contraband provision which was revoked by the Western Defense Command does not apply to them. They are still subject to the restrictions of the Department of Justice which prohibits them from having short wave radios, cameras, and so forth.

To avoid attracting public attention, Issei's are advised not to speak Japanese on the streets and in other public places. They should not bow to each other because this makes them conspicuous.

## RELOCATION FAVORABLE IN NEW ORLEANS REGION

In order to look over relocation prospects and other general condition, five men from Rohwer recently visited the New Orleans area and found the city very favorable. The trip was under the auspices of the Resettlement Planning Commission of the Community Council.

The group, including C. B. Price, Chester Fujino, Council chairman and chairman of the Resettlement Planning Commission, Koh Murai, farm specialist, S. Ito, chairman of Block Managers and K. Hattori, foreman of lumberjacks, were escorted by R.E. Arnes, relocation officer of the New Orleans area.

A 7,200 acre plantation, Avery Island which has the largest and best known bamboo forest in the country, various vegetable and fishmarkets were among the places visited.

# 100TH BATTALION MEN CITED

## Seven Awarded Distinguished Service Cross

Additional testimony to the heroism of the 100th Infantry Battalion (Separate), composed of American doughboys of Japanese descent from Hawaii, came today in the announcement

of awards of the Distinguished Service Cross to seven members of the famous Infantry unit, one award being posthumous.

Other awards, including many Silver Stars, Bronze

Star Medals and Purple Hearts, have been won by members of this unit.

All seven of today's awards were won in the Italian campaign. The 100th Infantry Battalion now is in action in France.

The doughboy who died winning his Distinguished Service Cross was Pfc. Kichi Koda, of Waipahu, Oahu. On July 9, 1944, near Castellina, Italy, he and four comrades charged with fixed bayonets into a wooded area, firing from the hip as they attacked and routed a group of Germans. Later, when the enemy opened fire from a small castle, Koda circled the structure and tossed hand grenades into each window, then charged it with his squad. He was killed by a German hand grenade, but his actions resulted in the death of ten Germans, the capture of three and the seizure of five enemy machineguns and four machine pistols.

S. Sgt. Yukio Yokota, Pfc. Haruto Kuroda, and Pvt. Thomas Y. Ono, all of Honolulu, functioned as a team, and each was cited for extraordinary heroism in action.

On June 2, 1944, the three crawled through a wheat field to within ten yards of an enemy machine gun and killed three Germans.

## REGULAT'N FOR PACKAGES TO JAPANESE P.W.S.

Information on mailing packages to Japanese prisoners of war in the United States were given out by E. W. Moyer, assistant delegate, International Committee of the Red Cross, Washington, D.C.

Regulations are:

1. Parcels can be sent postage free if the weight does not exceed 4 pounds each and if properly marked "Prisoner of War Mail." There is no limit as to how many parcels can be sent if they are within this weight limit.

2. If postage is paid the official parcel post weight limit of 70 pounds is not to be exceeded.

3. Letters addressed to prisoners of war require no postage if indicated "Prisoner of War Mail."

 mans with grenade. Under fire they crawled to a second position, eliminating it also. Later they attacked another German machinegun nest. Within three hours, the three of them had neutralized five enemy machineguns, five machine pistols and killed or captured 17 Germans.

Pfc. Kaoru Moto, of Sprockelsville, Maui, distinguished himself on July 7, 1944, by creeping to a German machinegun position and killing the gunner, then capturing the assistant gunner. Then he forced an enemy machinegun section to withdraw. Although wounded by a sniper, he wounded two more Germans and captured the third.

Pfc. Robert H. Yasutake, of Lahaina, Maui, on June 2, 1944, first neutralized an enemy machinegun position, then wounded seven Germans with his rifle and grenades, fought a duel with Germans in a dugout, and killed three others.

Pvt. Jesse M. Hirato, of Honaunau, on June 5, 1944, crawled toward an enemy sniper only to discover that his rifle had jammed. He picked up a
