RELOCATION GRANT CLARIFIED

PROCEDURE SAME AS BEFORE, REPORTS PRICE

RUMOR CHASER

Project Director Ray D. Johnston announced this week that Charles Wisdom, community analyst, had been appointed Rohwer's official rumor chaser.

It will be Wisdom's job to track down and nail any and all rumors heard by evacuees or members of the appointed personnel.

Said Rumor Chaser Wisdom: "Anybody hearing any rumor should please report it to me at once."

He can be reached at the Community Analysis office in Block 42 in person or by telephone.

Discussions at block meetings on Tuesday, Jan. 16, have indicated that confusion exists with regard to WRA relocation grants.

According to C. B. Price, relocation program officer, the grant procedure is the same as it has been for center residents. There has been some modification for persons who are now out on indefinite leave. Need has always been the basis for determination of eligibility for subsistence and meal grants. Anyone making false statements for the purpose of obtaining subsistence will be subject to fine or imprisonment.

Evac. Prop'ty Changes Off.

The Evacuee Property office moved yesterday from Administration Building 1 to 42-3-A.

The Office is being transferred to Block 42, so that persons may go directly from the Relocation office to the Evacuee Property office, E. F. Owen, evacuee property officer, reported.

This statement has been on each assistance application since the beginning of the relocation program.

The grant policy is as follows: A person who has \$100 or less in cash resources is entitled to subsistence grant of \$25 plus \$3 per day (\$1 per meal) while traveling to the point of relocation. If the person has over \$100 in cash resources but less than the sum of \$125 plus meal allowance, he will receive upon application the difference between his cash resources and \$125 plus meal allowance. OWENS GIVES INSTRUCTIONS ON PERSON'L PROP'TY MATTERS

The importance of furnishing shipping instructions or requesting project storage of all personal property before leaving the Center, was stressed by E. F. Owens, evacuee property officer. The following procedure should be followed:

"An evacuee having property in the Center or War Relocation warehouses shall not be eligible for either a transportation or subsistence grant unless he executes Form WRA-156 requesting the shipment of such property to his point of relocation or other designated destination.

"Person who departs from the Center without approval of their relocation plan shall, thereafter, be ineligible for relocation assistance grants of any kind, which includes the transportation of personal effects from the Relocation Center to the point of relocation. It is important that all evacuees who relocate and leave the Center and have personal property, execute WRA-156 before leaving the

ASSURES SOLDIERS OF HELP FOR FAMILIES

Assuring Nisei servicemen that their families in relocation centers will receive all possible aid, copies of a message from Secretary Harold Ickes are being distributed to residents suggesting that they be mailed to their soldiers.

In a letter to the Project Director accompanying a copy of Ickes' message, Dillon Myer declared, "Every effort should be made to carry out these steps aimed at maintaining the morale of servicemen who may be concerned over the future welfare of their parents and families. In the national office, to aid in accomplishing this purpose, we have arranged with the Army News Service

to send the text by radio to Army newspapers using the service all over the world."

Ickes' message follows: "I have gained deep satisfaction, which must have come to you as well, from the announcement by the Western Defense Command that the West Coast mass exclusion orders have been lifted. This action is a well-earned recognition of the loyalty which the great majority of evacuee people of Japanese descent have displayed in the severest test that any group of Americans has ever had to face. It is a victory of faith in the principles of real Americanism, and of unflinching patriotism

The following information is taken from WRA's Post-Exclusion Bulletin No. 4.

VISIT REGULATIONS

Numerous inquiries have been received relative to the policy on visits to

centers, particularly as it concerns visits of a day or less duration by nearby residents.

Visiting procedure as outlined in Manual Section 150.1.10 affects all persons of Japanese ancestry regardless of whether they are former center residents or voluntary evacuees, or others.

Any visit other than those for emergency purposes is to be considered in terms of its value to relocation. There are many reasons for this but two are particularly pertinent and obvious.

1. All efforts at the centers are to be pointed toward relocation and other activities such as visits for purely social reasons must be sharply curtailed.

2. Most of the centers are in isolated areas and transportation facilities even from the immediately adjoining territory are limited and must be conserved for the vastly increased flow of resettling center residents. There must be no resettling evacuee left behind while transportation facilities are occupied by casual visitors.

On the other hand, it is recognized that many visitors can make a distinct contribution to re-

Cash resources shall be construed to include currency on hand, checking or savings accounts, U.S. Postal Savings accounts, income anticipated from property or other investments, not including WRA cash advances (pay roll payments) or grants within 30 days following the date of application. The following are not considered as cash resources: War bonds, securities, insurance policies, trust funds, non-revenue producing property, or any other type of property, personal or otherwise, not mentioned as constituting resources in cash.

E. FINCH ENTERTAINS NISEI— SERVICEMEN AT HOTEL ASTOR=

New York--Earl M. Finch, the Hattiesburg, Miss., farmer who has befriended thousands of Nisei soldiers, entertained some 150 of them on Jan. 9 at a party in New York City's famous Hotel Astor on Times Square.

Among the guests were four wounded Hawaiian-born veterans of the fighting in Europe; Pfc. Irving Okahoshi, winner of the Distinguished Service Cross, T/4 Robert Oda and Pvt. Tamotsu Shimizu, all of the 100th Infantry Battalion; and Pfc. Saturu Kato, of the 442nd Infantry Regiment. Most of the other Nisei honored by Mr. Finch were unassigned soldiers from Hawaii and the mainland in New York on furlough.

Two pictures taken at the party were published the next day by the New York Daily News, which referred to Mr. Finch as a "one-man USO."

"This means that all persons relocating must see the Evacuee Property officer whose office is in 42-3-A, and make the necessary arrangements for the shipping of their personal property."

ONCE OVER

There seems to be an organized move on along the Pacific Coast to bluff evacuees into not going back. If we believe these wild rumors and are frightened into not returning, we are going to be the losers, economically and otherwise. Courage, along with good sound reasoning and common sense, will be needed. Many of the rumors are being circulated by people who stand to profit economically, if we don't return. That point has never been better illustrated than by the following case:

At the time of evacuation, an Oregon Nisei leased his farm, equipment, large home, and furnishings for five years to two parties named Dale Bergh and H.I. Anderson. The leases stipulated, in part, that "the (Nisei) may, upon the termination of the present emergency, be permitted to return... and, upon such return, may demand and receive possession of said leased premises... upon giving the lessees 30 days notice of such intention to return." The leases were executed in April, 1942, in the office of the Nisei's attorney, one C.G. Schneider.

On the lifting of the Exclusion Orders, the Nisei had his trust company prepare and serve the 30-day notice. Two weeks later, on Dec. 29 and Jan. 2, the Portland newspapers ran news items about the formation of two new groups called "Oregon Anti-Japanese, Inc." and "Anti-Japanese, Inc." Now here is the pay-off; the secretary-treasurer of one of the new corporations is C.G. Schneider, while two of its organizers are Dale Bergh and H.I. Anderson.

"The removal of the exclusion orders forecasts an end of the need to provide the refuge of the relocation centers for thousands of loyal and law-abiding people who are now free to live wherever they desire to make their homes in the United States. It is for their own best interest, and for the interests of all Americans of Japanese descent, that they should leave the centers as soon as possible. I am fully aware that departing from the centers will involve difficult readjustments for some people, but they will be given ample time to make them and the WRA Relocation Authority will continue to give all of the assistance that it has previously given. Federal and state welfare agencies will aid families that need special help.

"This message is addressed to you with full confidence that you will continue to enlarge upon the splendid record of America's fighting Nisei, which has been so effective in demonstrating that Americanism is not a matter of race or ancestry, and in winning the respect of all good Americans for their loyal

It should be a simple matter for such applicants to state their purpose in writing and if that purpose is bona fide and visitor should be welcomed. This does not preclude evacuees from districts immediately adjoining the center from visiting the residents if their visits are for the purpose of relocation.

It should be pointed out also that evacuees are free to leave the centers on short-term passes to visit their friends in nearby communities. Obviously evacuees will get a much better idea of conditions outside by making such visits than having visitors from the outside come in to see them.

It is also recognized that many visitors can contribute to the relocation of friends and potential business associates in the centers, even though they are not immediate family members, and such visits may be permitted.

日本語パンフレットの歴史は、明治時代にさかのぼる。この時代、日本は世界に開かれており、多くの洋書が輸入され、その翻訳や解説書として出版された。その中で、1873年に発行された「日本語パンフレット」は、最初のものとされる。このパンフレットは、明治天皇の御内帑金をもとに作成されたもので、その内容は、日本文化、政治、経済、社会など多岐にわたる。その後、明治維新後、西洋文化の影響を受け、日本語の翻訳書や解説書が増加する。また、明治時代には、日本政府が国際化を目指すために、多くのパンフレットを海外に輸出する。その結果、世界中の人に日本を理解してもらう機会が増加した。しかし、第二次世界大戦後、日本のパンフレットは、主に内需用として生産されるようになる。その後、冷戦化により、日本は東側陣営の一員として位置づけられ、その影響で、パンフレットの輸出は減少する。しかし、1980年代以降、世界の経済成長とともに、日本文化の普及が進むことから、パンフレットの輸出も再び増加する。現在では、世界中の多くの言語で翻訳された日本語パンフレットが、多くの人々に届けられている。
