ASKS PROTECTION OF RETURNING EVACUEES

San Francisco, Jan. 18--Robert W. Kenny, attorney general of California, has written the law onforcement officers of the state calling upon them to see that returning Japanese-American people are given full protection. In his letter he quotes the text of a statement issued by the Stato Law Enforcement Advisory Committee after a special meeting called at the suggestion of Go vernor Earl Warron.

The statement follows: "We consider it our sworn duty as law enforcement officers to fully cooperate with the Army authorities in dealing with

the return of the Japanese residents of this state. All persons, regardless of race, are entitled to the full protection of the Dw. The Army has carefully investigated each person to be permitted to return and will not allow those who are potentially dangerous to roturn.

s hould be difficulty involved in this transition unless incidents are provoked by intemporate words and thoughtlessness.

"During this period of adjustment the reputation of each of our California communities will be at stake. We have faith the good judgment of the people of California. We o onfidently expect All citizens to join with us in futhering full respect of the individual rights involved."

Scope of the sorvices the Farm Security Administ.ation (FSA) can make a-vailable to returning ovacuse farmers has been outlined in a letter sent to WRA by R. W. Hollenberg, regional director of the FSA, it was announced to-day by R. B. Cozzens, assistant director of WRA.

Before a loan can made to any applicant the FSA county committee, comprised of three prominent local farmers, must pass must pass on his eligibility, character and integrity, Hollen-

berg said.
RURAL REHABILITATION OR OPERATING LOADS

Rural rehabilitation or operating loans are available to citizens who quali-fy as low-income farm families (including owneroperators, tenants, share-oroppers and farm laborers with sufficient family man power for farm and home operations, except possi-bly at peak seasons) if certain other requirements can be met.

BASKETBALL:

During the winter month of 1891, Dr. James Nai - smith, then Director of Physical Eduction at Springfield, Illinois Y.M.C.A, seeing a lull in gymnasium abtivities among its members struck on ideas with the result; he hung two baskets, one each on opposite end of the gym wall, somewhat higher than the average height of man. He divided the single group into two different groups and handing them a large inflated ball similar to the medioine ball or the volleyball, pitted one group against them to see which of the group can ring the basket most.

This in that winter month of 1891, Dr. Naismith invented a new game which late was to be named "Basketball" and which in less than 50 years was to become one of the most popular National Sports in America. When statistics were taken of the five most popular sports-na mely, Baseball, Basketball, Football, Racing and Boxing-at the end of 1939-40 season, it was found that more than eighty million (30,000,000) fans all over America watched more than sixty thousand (60,000) teams. play one million five hundred thousand (1,500,000) games of basketballs. Comparatively on attendance, this was practically thirty million (30,000,000) mo re than baseball, forty million (40,000,000) more than football and fifty million (50,000,000) more than football and fifty million (50,000,000) more than boxing or racing.

Figures were based on statistics taken at end of 1939-40 season last year. under which the sports were played under normal. conditions.
