CTR. TO HOLD NISEI CONFAB JAMES SUGIOKA, BILL HOSOKAWA, SHERWOOD EDDY TO PARTICIPATE IN 3-DAY CONCLAVE

With "Nisei Action, Today and Tomorrow" as the theme, a three-day conference will be held March 2, 3, and 4, for the older Nisei of this Center. Its purpose will be to stimulate thinking and action on postcenter problems facing the Nisei.

General Chairman George Kaneko has lined up a value-packed program that includes open forums, discussions, panels, entertainment, banquet meetings, and speakers.

Conference speakers will be James Sugioka, field worker for the Committee on War Services of Disciples of Christ; Bill Hosokawa, veteran Nisei newspaperman, now of the Des Moines Register; and Sherwood Eddy, world traveler, author and lecturer.

SUPPLY EXHAUSTED: MEATLESS MEALS IN PROSPECT FOR CTR.

Chief Project Steward D. J. Hudson was informed Wednesday by the Quartermaster Market Center, Memphis, that they shall not be able to furnish this Project with any meat of any description through the month of February or March.

"At present, the Center warehouse stock is completely exhausted. The

local supply of hogs are temporarily used up and it will be approximately two weeks before we start slaughtering again. We have requisitioned from the West Coast a carload of fish which should arrive within two weeks. We are trying to buy on local market at Pine Bluff, fat hogs for immediate slaughter," Hudson said.

Southern California's largest Japanese Church--the Nishi Hongwanji Betsuin which served as a storage place for evacuee property--was opened on Feb. 20 as a hostel with the Rev. J. Goldwater in charge.

The Senshin Gakuen at 36th Place, Los Angeles, was also established as a hostel under the Rev. Goldwater. Evacuees are welcomed to make use of the hostels and aid in finding job offers will be extended, according to word received by the Rev. D. Hayashima.

RELOCATEE WRITES D. S. MYERS

From a former Rohwerian now of Massachusetts the following letter was written to Dillon S. Myers, USA director, concerning a new ruling withholding travel permit back to the center was received Thursday.

Dear Mr. Myers:

I have been corresponding with the special relocation officer of the New England area, Mr. Charles McCallister, about a travel permit for my sister and me to return to the Rohwer Center to see our parents to talk over plans for relocation. Our request was refused, as Mr. McCallister put it, upon existing rules and regulations.

This new ruling is unfair, because it allows girls whose parents can afford it, or who have received scholarships, to return home to camp at the end of a college term. I have been away from my parents and family for over a year doing housework, staying in one place to give the Nisei a good reputation.

Then another thing I would like to go into is this: Mr. Roger Clapp of the Boston office suggested I settle relocation plans through correspondence. I find this impossible, because my parents do not write hardly any English and I hardly any Japanese. If we could have a place to meet and talk it would be a much simpler matter. (Please do not suggest as Mr. McCallister did that my parents come out here. We cannot afford that.) Even Mr. McCallister finds it difficult to discuss in detail our rejection for unapplication through correspondence though both he and I write English. He writes me, "We would prefer that we might sit down with you and go into detail concerning the necessity for rejection your application... Therefore, we would be glad to have you and your sister come to our office so that we might discuss this matter with you."

I don't think you should bar us from entering the center, because while our parents are there it is our home by right. Any American who works away from home is free to return at will to his. Had my parents known this was going to be done to us, they would never have allowed us to leave camp and I will not be surprised if parents whose daughters finish high school this June will not let them go outside.

CHIPS VERS by BEN TAKEDA

Ray Richards, Willie Randolph Hearst's No. one mouthpiece, is at it again. The Hearstinker declares in a recent story that a produce price-cut war on a national scale has been started by evacuees "as a means of revenge on California"...Hood River News, early this month, carried a full-page paid ad headed "Japs are not wanted in Hood River." Wonder how those super-patriots reacted to the death of Frank Hachiya, whose name was among the 18 removed from the memorial. Incidentally, last Saturday's New York Times carried an excellent editorial on his heroism, titled "Private Hachiya, American."

Look for disclosures that will cause the Hood River fiasco to pale into insignificance, if the Frisco office of the WRA carries out a much-needed investigation. It involves the farm and home of a dead Nisei soldier. Briefly, the facts are these: a Sacramento Nisei left his 40-acre vineyard in care of the manager of a winery and rented his home completely furnished to a friend. The army called the Nisei, while his parents and sisters were removed here to Rohwer. Last October the boy was killed in France. He failed to leave a will. Under California law, the parents can inherit the property but must dispose of it within a year. The man in charge of the vineyard sent a report which showed that, after all expenses had been deducted, the crop netted about \$400. (The last year that the Nisei operated the vineyard himself, it produced 105 tons of grapes.) Moreover, the manager claims that he cannot get anybody to prune the vineyard for anything less than 100% of the crop. Meanwhile, the friend renting the home disappeared, and the entire household furnishings disappeared with him. Since then, the manager has rented the house to another Pearl Harborish. Well, it's
