

NISEI CONCLAVE UNDERWAY

GROUP DISCUSSIONS TAKE SPOTLIGHT

Opening in auspicious fashion yesterday afternoon, the Older Nisei Conference moves into high gear today with a slate of discussion meetings, a luncheon program, a round-table panel discussion and open forum, all topped off with a banquet meeting in the evening.

The discussions, which will begin at 8:30 a.m. at Mess hall 35 and last thru the morning, will be divided into three groups: social action, economic action, and political action. Dr. Kikuo Taira is chairman of the social action; Mike Itou, economic action; and Bean Takeda, political action.

A luncheon meeting is slated for noon in Mess 35 with Elmo Ito as toastmaster. A brief entertainment program will highlight the luncheon.

Following an afternoon discussion session at 1:30, a round-table panel discussion is programmed for 3:30 on the topic, "The Nisei Way of Action." Gracing the panel will be the following experts: Bill Hosokawa, Des Moines newspaperman; James Sugimura, Committee on War Services; A. G. Thompson, superintendent of education; Dr. Nat Griswold, CA supervisor; and Russell C. Derrickson, Washington WRA.

The meeting will be thrown open to questions and discussion from the audience after the panel. Presiding over the round-table and open forum will be Chairman Bean Takeda.

HOSOKAWA SPEAKS

A banquet meeting will be held tonight at 7:30 in Mess 35, with Bill Hosokawa as main speaker and Mike Itou as Toastmaster. Community singing and entertainment numbers will spice the program.

Tomorrow afternoon, at 2 p.m., a general conference assembly to report on the findings will convene at Mess 35. Chairman of the various discussion groups will present their findings to the delegates. General Chairman George Kaneko will preside.

EDDY TO ADDRESS

In the evening, at 7:30 p.m., the grand windup will come with a centerpiece meeting in the Auditorium with Sherwood Eddy, author, lecturer and world traveler, as speaker.

442nd RECEIVES SILVER PLAQUE

6TH ARMY GROUP, FRANCE-- Survivors of the 36th (Texas) Division's now-famous "Lost Battalion" have presented a Silver Plaque to the Japanese American soldiers of the 442nd Infantry Regiment who rescued them from death in a Nazi trap.

Under the "Remember the Alamo" regimental insignia of the 141st Infantry Regiment, of which the encircled battalion was a part, and under the insignia of the 442nd, are engraved these words:

Chairman Kaneko and his co-workers expressed themselves as satisfied with the progress of the conclave thus far. Stated Kaneko: "These meetings are open to all center residents, not just to Nisei, and we want you to feel free to attend any or all of the sessions."

"To the 442nd Infantry Regiment with deep sincerity and utmost appreciation for the gallant fight to effect our rescue after we had been isolated for seven days.--1st Battalion, 141st Infantry Regiment, Biffontaine, France. From the 24th to the 30th of October, 1944."

The Texans, surrounded by the Germans in the Vosges Mountains, were confined for a week to a circular area roughly 300 yards in diameter.

To accomplish the rescue, the Japanese American doughboys had to rely on a bayonet charge against superior enemy forces entrenched on top of a hill, knock out Nazi Tiger tanks, and work their way through two-and-a-half miles of terrain intricately and heavily mined, booby-trapped and road-blocked.

Hollywood D.A.U. Welcomes Nisei

ONCE OVERS

Stars and Stripes, the army newspaper, quotes a doughboy who has been in combat for 133 consecutive days: "People back home ought to know that if it wasn't for the Nisei, a lot of their sons would be dead now. They saved our lives...Our boys don't say these Nisei are as good as we are. We say they're a helluva lot better, that they've got moer guts, and we ought to know."

Interesting story behind the formation of the Pearl Harbor League in Washington State. An Issei formerly operated a farm and general store in Auburn, Wash. At the time of evacuation, he had five carloads of chemical fertilizer, which he stored. Since then, some farmers, needing fertilizer badly, have attempted to buy it at OPA prices. But the evacuees, hoping to return to Auburn to resume farming, has refused. Too, because fertilizer of this kind is almost impossible to buy, he feels he should get a price better than the OPA ceiling. The Auburn farmers have become extremely unfriendly as a result, and this was one of the factors that led to the PHL being formed. A few months ago, vandals broke into the general store and damaged furnishings stored there. The evacuee decided recently to sell the farm for \$21,000 and is thinking of selling the fertilizer, which has caused him so much trouble.

Returning evacuee was robbed of \$65 on a San Francisco bus. The bus driver then drove into a darkened garage and doused the lights to give the thief an opportunity to return the money. But it didn't work. Mr. and Mrs. K. Sadamuni, who have two boys overseas and the third in a Texas army camp, returned to Oakland, Calif. Last week an anonymous (Continued on page 4)

phone caller threatened: "If you don't get out of town, I'll cut your throat." The Sadamunis are still in Oakland. That's the spirit we need to lick those bluffers.

Mark Namba is a young Nisei, as you or I. He has never suffered the indignity of being ordered out of any place because of his race, not even after Pearl Harbor. Recently, he was inducted into the army and on a furlough, took a trip to his Oregon home to look over the family's 19-acre apple and pear orchard. There, he ran into a Caucasian friend, on furlough from the navy. The two of them entered a Richfield service station for gas and a bite to eat. The man in charge demanded of young Nambas: "Who are you?" When he gave his name, the man said: "We don't give service to any Jap. Get the hell out of here!" When the Nisei protested that he was an American soldier, the man added: "That uniform doesn't mean a damn thing to me!" Yes, dear reader, chalk up another black mark against Hood River. May God have mercy on their souls!

Ray Richards, the well-known Hearst hatchet man, comes up with another headline story. This time he claims evacuees will set up offices in Washington in an effort to "milk" the government of four million dollars for property losses. He says that "a number of Caucasian individuals and pinkish organizations" (obviously referring to the AECU) will front this Congressional lobby.
