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CURTISS CANDY CO. FARM WANTS FIFTEEN

There are openings for fifteen farm workers (sing le men) immediately at the Curtiss Candy Company Farm No. 63 at Marengo, Illinois.

The Curtis Farm Organ ization operates 11,000 acres of farm land in northwestern area of Il linois. The organization maintains sixty-two farms and engages in dairying, poultry, beef cattle, hog, truck gardening and general farming.

The Marengo Farm is located 72 miles from Chi cago and 23 miles from the town of Brookford. Marengo is three and a half miles from this farm. Community acceptance is excellent in this area and workers have been well received since the inception of the Truck Gardening Project.

Wages paid for single men is \$100 a month with board and room. Bonuses have been paid to workers during the past two years based on the crop yield. Workers become eligible for bonus after six months of service.

Workers live in a large dormitory which was constructed two and a half years ago. It is completely equipped and furnished with modern facilities. Hardwood floors, showers, laundry facilities and an oil furnace are installed in the dormitory. There is a spacious living room for use by the workers and an attractive dining room has been constructed.

The company will em ploy a Japanese cook to prepare food in the Japa nese style.

This offer is not sea sonal work but is perma nent with the work all year around.

There are ten Japanese workers living on this farm for the past two years. These workers have worked on the Truck Pro ject growing potatoes, soya beans, popoorn, and other garden products. A large farm program has been planned for this season.

Workers average 9 hours of work a day, with six days of work in a week.

These men will be paid a bonus if they work the full season or more. The season lasts from approximately April 1 to November 15. The employer wants particularly people who plan to stay more than one year. They will be provided housing rent free during the non-working time.

ROHWERIAN FINDS STOCKTON FRIENDLY

Shoji Tabuchi, Winter

Humburger's home, Tabuchi writes of having dinner with three Nisei soldiers stationed at Tracy at her invitation. Prior to and since evacuation she did much for those of Japanese ancestry and their friendship has meant much to them. Before Tabuchi's arrival Miss Humburger met with College of Pacific heads to discuss problems of student relocation. At every available opportunity she has presented and explained the Nisei problem to the public. It seems Tabuchi has enrolled at COP, being the first Nisei to do so. Residents have shown no ill-feeling, according to Tabuchi.

In a recent letter to his family, Tabuchi enclosed a clipping from the Stockton Record. It follows in part:

"The Stockton Inter-Racial Council had gone on record urging the community to manifest a friendly and democratic attitude toward returning Japanese-American citizens of this area. This action was taken at Tuesday's meeting in the First Congregational Church, according to a spokesman for the group.

"At the same time, the council placed the responsibility of relieving the acute housing shortage for the minority races upon the government, and called for relief of the situation before the Japanese return.

There was not enough to add to the mounting time at the recent confab problem.

"Housing in this area hence, the decision to hold formerly occupied by Japanese, meeting which will now house Negroes, be the first of a series Filipinos and Mexicans in of bimonthly meetings.

After three years of living in the centers, the Issei still look upon the Nisei as young, immature, incapable upstarts. I'm speaking of the Issei in this center, as I do not know the situations in the other camps. But if I know my Issei--and I do--they're probably of the same attitude as the Issei here.

Which is really too bad. Not for us Nisei, but for the Issei. It's too bad, because it indicates that they haven't progressed much in their thinking in the past three years.

It shows that the Issei are still thinking along the lines of the pre-evacuation days, when they ran the show and the Nisei were mere striplings just out of our swaddling clothes. Oh, there were some Nisei who managed to break thru the retaining barrier of the paternal autocracy and achieve a bit of success. But they were regarded as "accidents" or "freaks," who climbed the rung by luck or with Issei help.

According to the Issei way of thinking, the Nisei were just too young, too inexperienced, too incapable, ~~too~~ everything! They forgot that they were young once themselves. They forgot that they were also without experience themselves, till they got the chance to prove themselves.

In the main, tho, their biggest failing was in always regarding the Nisei as "too young." No matter if able Nisei reached the ripe age of 30, it was always the same "Too young," they said.

Well, came the evacuation, and you should have heard some of them cry. Perhaps you did hear them. You remember the tune. Why didn't the Nisei do something to prevent it? Why didn't the Nisei stand up on our hind legs and demand that the military let us stay on the coast? Why didn't the Nisei do this, and that and that?

something akin to scorn by the Issei, now was looked to by these same Issei for leadership. And when the JACL, floundering around under weak leadership, did the best it could under the circumstances, it came in for much scathing criticism from the Issei. Much of it was justified, perhaps, but much more of it was not.

After being shipped to the centers, some of the Issei who were leaders in the Japanese communities back on the West coast, were a trifle hungry for "power." But when they learned that only Nisei were eligible, under a WRA ruling, for elective offices, they let out a howl that was heard all the way in Washington.

And when Washington, partly to mollify them and partly because relocation was draining these centers of the Nisei leaders, revised its ruling to permit Issei to be elected councilmen, the Issei here quieted down, in much the same manner as a crying child when he is given a lollipop to suck.

Well, that followed after that is as plain as the mole on your uncle's nose. They did some good, of course. But they also found time to indulge in some peanut politics which have been a constant source of amusement to the rest of us.

And now that the time has come to consider relocation seriously in all its practical aspects, the Issei are still continuing to make the same old mistakes. They are proceeding about their business as if there were not Nisei

herd at all. If that sounds a bit harsh, then why weren't the local Nisei consulted about the proposals that were carried by the local representatives to the recent inter-center conference in Salt Lake City? The delegates were supposed to represent all the people in the center. But they didn't represent all of us any more than the Hearst Papers do the American people.

Local Issei leaders should remember that there are still Nisei living in the centers. Local Issei leaders should remember, too, that the Issei will necessarily have to depend on the Nisei a great deal during the coming months in resettlement, readjustment, and rehabilitation.

Lest some people misconstrue my statements, let me state plainly that I have no personal axes to grind. I speak for all the Nisei in the center. I'm running the risk of being called a fresh up-start by some of the Issei. But I'm not worried. I've been called that before.

But I am worried about the Issei's inability or unwillingness to cast off their pre-Pearl Harbor type of thinking in favor of some plain, unadulterated, look-to-the-future type of common sense.
