MOURN DEATH OF FDR

Ichiki Killed On German Front

To Kinzo Ichiki, 10-1-F, came the dreaded news this week from the War Department that his son, T-3 Stanley T. Ichiki, had been killed in action on March 29 in Germany.

He was from Lodi and had never lived in an evacuation center. In addition to his father, young Ichiki is survived by three sisters: Yoneko (resettled in New York), Miyo, and Shizuye; and one brother: Kingo.

Residents of the Center are mourning the death this week of President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The chief executive passed away suddenly at Warm Springs, Ga., on Thursday afternoon, 3:35 p.m. (CWT), of a cerebral hemorrhage.

Two and a half hours later, Vice-President Harry S. Truman was sworn in as the 32nd president of the United States by

Stated Community Council Chairman Chester Fujino yesterday:

"Mr. Roosevelt was a world citizen who lived up to the highest ideals of mankind. May his spirit guide the world in the construction of an everlasting peace."

Chief Justice Stone in a ceremony at the White House in Washington.

The funeral will be held in the White House today and the president's body will be buried at the Roosevelt home in Hyde Park, N. Y., tomorrow.

According to Project Director Johnston, the flag in front of Administration building one will be flown at half-staff for 30 days.

Messages of condolence have been sent to the White House by the Buddhist Church and by CC Chairman Fujino.

The local hospital has organized a crew of six evacuees supervised by Mr. Araze for malaria control in the center.

This group will spray the ground and all breeding places of mosquitoes and under the barracks if necessary.

Mr. Robbins, Hospital Administrator, added, "Rohwer is the only one to have this service."

We think you may be interested in glancing thru it. For we are proud of the achievements of these boys. We are proud that they are serving under the Stars and Stripes. And we wish to share that pride with you and with our 130 million fellow Americans.

(Continued from page 2) would be employed at prevailing county wage during the harvest season. The wages of the heads of the families are 60¢ an hour. All of the other members of the family would be paid 50¢ an hour. Housing will be provided free of charge in a bungalow which has two kitchens, one living room and three bedrooms, and electricity provided free of charge. Heater will be installed to provide hot water, either a shower or a "Nhonburo." All decorating and painting will be provided by the owner. Equipment on the farm includes four Farmall tractors, two load trucks, two field trucks, a large packing shed, and other miscellaneous equipment. The schools are within four miles of the farm, and a bus provides free transportation to both grammar and high schools. A garden plot will be provided for the families, as well as a small place to raise chickens.


