## Nisei Mt. Boys Doing Fine

Nisei intelligence men are doing an excellent job in the Philippines according to Russell A. Bankson, Washington War Relocation Authority, whose son, Lt. Col. Roger Bankson, is commanding a battalion on Luzon.

Lt. Col. Bankson was an intelligence officer, with several Nisei on his staff, until his recent promotion. He was raised to his present rank within an hour after he had conducted Gen. MacArthur on a tour of the battlelines.

Bankson, who is a field man for the Washington reports division, has been visiting the center the past week to coordinate the dissemination of information.

## D. S. MYER COMMENTS

WRA comments on recommendations of the all-center conference were received this week by Chester Fujino of the Community Council.

A Japanese translation will be made, and complete copies of these comments will be distributed.

Following is one of the replies made by the WRA. Recommendation No. 8, that the WRA continue the operation of evacuee property offices for the duration, was answered as follows:

"WRA plans to continue operation of the evacuee property offices on the West coast until April 2, 1946 -- or virtually up until the time when the agency itself will go out of existence. All relocating or returning evacuees are given a 60-day period (after leaving the center) within which to remove their property from the warehouses. In emergency cases, application may be made to the appropriate field office for extension of this time but in no case beyond April 2, 1946."

This, and twenty other recommendations have been studied by the WRA staff, and their comments follow.

## FOUR NEW OFFICES IN SOUTHERN CAL.

Four new relocation offices are being set up in Southern California to help expedite the return of those still in relocation centers, according to Dillon S. Myer, National Director of WRA.

The four new offices will be located in Santa Barbara, Santa Ana, El Centro, and San Diego and 12 district offices will operate under the Los Angeles area office.

According to the Los Angeles Evening Herald, 580 evacuees have resettled in this area, and 12,000 are expected to return.

## LETTER SENT TO DELEGATES

In a letter to Masaru Narahara, chairman of the conference, Dillon S. Myer said, in part, "There are several places in my comments where I urged that persons with special problems bring them to the project attorney, the welfare section, or other project offices. We are prepared to assist those whose funds are frozen, who are parolees who have financial or legal questions, or other problems to try to find answers to solutions. One of the steps which you recommended and which we are prepared to take is the employment of responsible Japanese speaking assistants at several of our field offices."

"There is one final point I want to make, and I address myself to those parents who have children of school age. I am anxious they have education in the kind of community that will make them good citizens of whom their parents are proud. The school people of the West Coast and of other parts of the country have pledged co-operation that your children will be received in the true spirit of American Democracy."

Mr. and Mrs. Kitagawa, 5-8-F, left one night this week for Royal Oak, Michigan, a Detroit suburb.

Ordinarily, such an item would not be news. But Mr. Kitagawa is 74 years old, and his wife is 61.

They are going to the Michigan town on a job offer from Dr. Thomas Pryor, pastor of the First Methodist church there, where Mr. Kitagawa will be janitor and maintenance man.

The relocation division said that the Kitagawas are one of the oldest couples to leave Rohwer to resettle on their own.

Most of the old couples leaving here do so in order to join their son or daughter or other members of the family.

But the Kitagawas are striking out on their own, and they are doing it the hard way at their advanced age.

Mr. Kitagawa has been retired, he said, for the past ten or twelve years. But I'll venture to state that he has done more work since he retired than a good many men do in the active stages of their life.

He is one of the most active, energetic men I have ever seen.

For about ten years, from 1930 to 1940, Mr. Kitagawa and his five sons operated a large fruit orchard near Sacramento, California.

A year before Pearl Harbor, they sold their orchard and moved to Los Angeles, where the evacuation caught them up a year and a half later.

The Kitagawas' contribution to the Armed Forces is a unique one, and a proud one. They have four sons in the service, and three of them are on overseas combat duty.

Two of them were drafted, and two volunteered. The fifth brother, who is the oldest, also volunteered, but he was rejected for a
