ROHWER CASUALTIES FIVE KILLED, SEVEN WOUNDED

Deaths of five Nisei infantrymen and wounding of seven others in Italy have been reported to their families here by the War Department; it was revealed this week.

The casualties presumably occurred in the crunching Fifth Army drive on Massa two weeks ago. The boys were attached to the now famous 442nd Regiment, which is back with the Fifth after seven months of service with the Seventh Army in France.

Pfc. Robert T. Kishi, 27, formerly of Stockton,

Calif., was killed on April 8. He had been in action a year. He is survived by his father, Yakumatsu Kishi, 27-5-F, a younger sister, Jeanne, and a younger brother, T-Sgt. Yukio Kishi, with the Army Air Corps in France.

Also killed on the same day was T-4 William I. Imamoto, 26, formerly of Port Orchard, Wash. He was in

Pfc. Robert T. Kishi and T-4 William I. Imamoto who were both killed on the same day (April 8), were among the 40 Nisei soldiers who received a 34th Infantry Division Commendation last July for successfully completing a dangerous 50-mile reconnaissance patrol in the vicinity of Pisa, Italy.

Their citation read, in part: "For exceptionally meritorious conduct in combat. Every member of the patrol displayed the highest soldierly qualities of skill, courage, and determination. Their action was exemplary and a credit to the Armed Forces of the United States."

ONCE OVERS

"The Nisei boys are pretty damn good fighters. And their bravery under fire is second to none."

The speaker was S-Sgt. Dave Hirahara, 27, late a member of the fighting 442nd outfit for which he volunteered in August, 1943.

Dave should know for he fought with his Measi buddies thru some of the toughest kind of fighting in the Vosges region of France. The battling there, he said, was rougher and fiercer than in the Italian campaign, in which the Combat Team got its baptism of fire.

Dave came within a cat's hair of being buried beneath a white cross in the Vosges fighting. Like all returned veterans, he was reluctant to discuss how he sustained his injuries.

I learned later that he was leading his platoon thru the dense, German-infested woods of the Vosges mountains. They were crawling cautiously forward, keeping alert eyes peeled for the enemy.

Suddenly, a machine gun nearby chattered, and a clip of shots nearly tore Dave's head off. Three bullets pierced his forehead almost in the center and came out on his left side, directly in front of his ear.

Blood began spurting from the wounds. But he continued to direct his men, and gave orders and directions for almost five minutes after he had been hit. He didn't know he had been wounded, till he rubbed his hand over his head and found it dripping with blood.

A medic rushed up, knelt down beside him, and started pouring some sulfa drug into the wounds. A German sniper put a bullet thru the medic's head, killing him instantly.

Then, just before losing consciousness, Dave spotted some litter-bearer's running like mad toward him, found himself quickly picked up and placed on the
