E.B. MOULTON: MARRIAGE LAWS ARE REVISED

Due to the change in the marriage laws made at the recent session of the Arkansas General Assembly, effective immediately it will be necessary that applications for marriage licenses be made at least one week in advance of the ceremony, stated Mr. E. B. Moulton Community Management Chief today.

OBTAIN BIRTH CERTIFICATES FROM STATE OFFICIAL ONLY

It has been reported here that the Veterans Administration and other Government Agencies that require certified copies of birth certificates will no longer accept copies made by any person except the state official who has charge of the records. It is a waste of time to have the Notary Public in the Project Attorney's office make copies and certify birth certificates.

ROHWER SETS PACE FOR RELOCATION

Rohwer led all other centers with the largest number of people relocating during the week ending April 21. Terminal leaves issued here for that period totaled 136.

The next highest was Minidoka with 108, Heart Mountain with 91, and Granada with 77. From December 31 to April 21, 1945, there have been 6,451 terminal leaves from all centers: 1,489 of these returned to California, 310 to Washington, 256 to Oregon, 14 to Arizona and 4,352 to other states.

442ND IN OFFENSIVE

Washington D. C. - Members of the 442nd Infantry Regiment, composed of American doughboys of Japanese descent, are in the vanguard of the Fifth Army's great offensive which has smashed the German Army in northern Italy, the War Department reported today. Soldiers of this crack outfit came, for the most part, from Government re-

location camps in this country and from Hawaii.

Making sensational gains of 76 miles in five days, the 442nd took part in the capture of Genoa, Italy's largest seaport, on April 27, and then forged ahead to enter Turin, the last great city in the Po River Valley, on April 30. The 442nd entered Genoa along with the 473rd Infantry Regiment, which then swung around in a southwesterly direction. Both regiments are attached to the 92nd Infantry Division.

Activated on February 1, 1943, in response to request of many loyal American-born Japanese to serve in the Armed forces, the 442nd set a high standard of training at Camp Shelby, Mississippi. The Japanese Americans arrived in Italy late in May, 1944.

The famous Japanese American 100th Infantry Battalion, already fighting in Italy, and composed of former activated Hawaiian National Guardsmen, became the first Battalion of the new regiment. The 100th Battalion was one of the first Ground Units to receive the presidential Unit citation for fighting in Italy.

SIGN UP FOR FOURTH CAR TO CALIFORNIA

The next special car to California has been tentatively set for May 24. This car will leave only if enough residents sign up to fill the car to a reasonable capacity.

To date, about eleven persons have signed up for passage on a special coach.

The routing of this car will be St. Louis, Kansas City, Denver, Ogden, Sacramento.

Since the seating capacity of the auditorium, in accordance with fire regulations, is 1280 persons, and since there are approximately that many chairs already there, Fire Chief John Mailes has asked that residents do not bring their own chairs to the Co-op free movie tonight, and tomorrow night, as announced in the last issue of the OUTPOST.
