

MARKET FOR FARM TOOLS

Evacuees who left used farm equipment or automobiles in storage last year can find a ready market for them at fair prices, according to a statement received today by Project director Ray D. Johnston from Russell T. Robinson, chief of WRA's Evacuee Property office in San Francisco.

The serious manpower shortage in agriculture and a sharp curtailment in the manufacture of new farm machinery make it imperative that all used farm equipment be made available for this year's food production, Johnston was advised.

Evacuees having farm equipment or automobiles in storage and who desire to dispose of them are requested to write to the Evacuee Property Office, War Relocation Authority, Whitcomb Hotel Bldg., San Francisco, Calif. It is particularly important that the letter state the exact location of the equipment, the make, model, age and condition.

CO-OP OPENS SHOE STORE; STOCK LIMITED

With a stock of approximately 1500 pairs of shoes, the Community Enterprises shoe store opens its door this morning at PS hall 42.

Footwear for infants, school children and adults is on sale, announced Tomio Gohata, manager of the store. Ladies' shoes run from sizes 3 to 6, and men's from sizes 5 to 9. Although there are both dress and work shoes, the majority of the present stock consists of the latter. High tops and boots are not available.

Gohata stated that the shoes are of standard quality with prices ranging from 75 cents to three dollars.

The Community Enterprises shoe department will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. The present site is temporary and will be changed as soon as a favorable place can be found.

PRE-EVACUATION CONTRABANDS

Since contraband articles confiscated before evacuation have been transferred to the custody of the US Marshall, Center residents were asked by L. F. Sloan, WRA property supervisor in Los Angeles, to discontinue writing to their home town police stations for information concerning their properties.

"We are endeavoring to obtain instructions from the US Attorney General's office, but as yet no procedure has been worked out," Sloan said.

The Transportation and Supply section under C. V. Updegraff is in touch with the Washington office, in order to notify the residents as soon as the properties are released.

CENTER TO PARTICIPATE IN MARCH OF DIMES CAMPAIGN

On Monday, Jan. 25, the annual war against infantile paralysis, the March of Dimes, was inaugurated.

Center residents will have their chance to participate in the national drive.

In each block, persons over 18 will be asked for voluntary contributions to this cause. The blocks having the greatest percentage of donors will be given the privilege of sending a representative to the Little Rock campaign office.

The Little Rock Infantile Paralysis Clinic has been opened to all persons in the Center. Part of the receipts will go to the state fund and the remainder to the national fund.

The campaign headed by chairman Tom Makino will end Monday at 3 p.m.

FOOD POISONING HITS BLOCK 3

A mild outbreak of food poisoning occurred in Block 3 Sunday.

Without complete details available it was presumed by Dr. W. T. Carstarphen, chief medical officer, that the cause lay in faulty refrigeration of the food which was prepared on the preceding day.

All those who suffered from this condition have fully recovered. Contrary to rumors, there were no fatalities. Several cases were brought to the hospital, the remaining were treated at their homes.

SEEDS, FERTILIZER, MULES PURCHASED FOR FARMING

That Rohwer will have a supply of vegetable crops was indicated in the purchase of approximately \$2000 of a variety of vegetable seeds by the procurement division recently.

Requisitions have been filed by J. C. Moody, senior procurement officer, for 20,000 pounds of Bliss Triumph potato seeds and also 7000 pounds of Irish Cobbler potato seeds.

Other types of seeds

include carrots, English peas, snap beans, lima beans, spinach, onions, radish and sweet corn.

MESS WORKERS TO BE CHECKED

Beginning in the near future, a physical checkup will be made of all food handlers and mess hall personnel, announced Dr. W. T. Carstarphen, chief medical officer.

A card will be issued to all persons who have complied with the requirements of the physical examinations.

Requests will be sent to employees to come to the hospital for their examinations.

This checkup is being held to safeguard the health of the community, explained Dr. Carstarphen.

In addition, 250 tons of commercial fertilizer, 40 heads of mules and 5 additional wagons were purchased, according to Moody.

At the same time, James R. Rains, assistant Project director, announced that if the weather is good, peas and potatoes would be planted during the latter part of February.

SCRAP FIRM TO HIRE EVACUEES

With many men needed in the nation's scrap industry, word has been received recently by E. B. Moulton, Employment and Housing head, that representatives from scrap firms in Kansas, Missouri and Nebraska will arrive soon at this Center to interview applicants.

The first locality offering employment will be Kansas City, Mo. The work will involve sorting, loading and collecting scrap metal.

Moulton urged interested applicants to file leave clearances at ad building 2.

Therefore, aliens will not be required to file change of address notices in regard to their residence at this Project.

However, any alien leaving the Project pursuant to an indefinite leave must report his change of address to the Department of Justice.

Firemen, P40's In Cage Victories

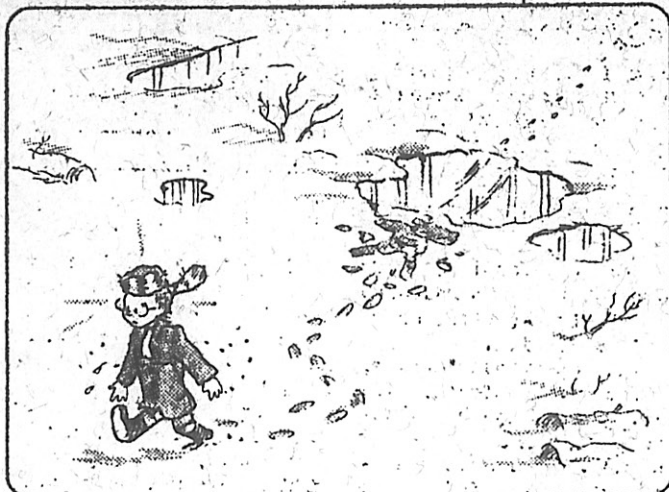
The hot Firemen opened their cage campaign with a close 15-14 triumph over the Block 4 quintet Sunday afternoon at court 27.
