In these new classes, much help will be given in learning to speak English especially in making the difficult sounds. Attention will also be given to reading and writing.

If adults who want to learn English fail to en- roll in these new classes, they will probably not have another opportunity to receive much instruction.

No community outside is likely to provide classes where only those adults who speak Japanese may meet together and learn English.

Many residents who speak broken English want help in speaking English correctly. They want to speak English so well that it will be acceptable outside this center.

ONCE OVERS

There is something soul-satisfying about getting up early on Sunday mornings.

It gives one a highly self-satisfied, smug, hollow-throated feeling, something very similar to the after-effects of attending a midweek Bible class. WORKERS WANTED

The following are some specialized types of employment which might find a taker among center residents:

The United Charities of Chicago, a private welfare agency which is contributing a great deal of time and money to the welfare of resettlers, wishes to employ a Negro case worker with a Master's degree in social service administration or its equivalent, preferably with four quarters of supervised field work with at least two quarters in psychiatric case work. Experience will be considered in lieu of part of the academic requirements. The beginning salary will be \$135 to \$200 a month plus overtime for hours worked in excess of 36 hours a week.

HOUSING FOR EVACUEE WAR WORKERS

Buffalo, N.Y. - Evacuees employed in essential industries are eligible and can obtain housing in government projects in suburban Buffalo, it was revealed.

Government housing authorities met with the representatives from the Buffalo Resettlement Committee and the relocation officer recently to discuss the problem of securing proper housing for evacuees.

Quarters are available for small family groups now. "Have your relocation program officer write early and we will see that your request gets quick attention," said George Graff, relocation officer.

Two evacuee families are already living in one of the projects, and their experiences have been very favorable. They have won their way into the community, and their friendliness and cooperativeness were soon recognized and they're among the most popular people in the community, said the project housing manager.

The Detroit WRA office can furnish any center resident who might be interested in Michigan farming with a list of names and addresses of evacuees who are at present engaged in agriculture in the state.

I could feel the tension in the air as I took my seat. Nobody spoke. Everybody seemed to sense that a long-standing precedent was being broken. Women nudged their husbands and whispered something to them, and strong men gasped and rubbed their eyes in incredulous disbelief.

Then suddenly, the stifled silence was broken. I was showered with congratulations, and accolades cascaded upon me from all sides. Some shook my hand, others patted me on the back, all were profuse in their praise and hearty in their approbation.

That convinced me. That was the clincher, the coup de main. If any act of mine were to bring such universal approval from my fellow men, I could well afford to make the supreme sacrifice, namely: giving up 2½ hours of sleep each morning. Hence, I have continued with my early-rising ways.

As a result, I understand, there is a movement under way to take proper cognizance of this accomplishment and to see that such a laudable attainment does not go unrewarded. The residents of my block are said to be seriously considering presenting me with a scroll of honor, which will read something like this:

"For praiseworthy achievement and meritorious public service to the block by appearing early for breakfast thus enabling the dishwashers and waitresses to finish work and go home earlier, and thus contributing to the morale, esprit de corps, and general all-around welfare of the community."
