TWO RECEIVE HIGH AWARDS

DSC PRESENTED POSTHUMOUSLY

Award of the Distinguished Service Cross for gallantry in action was posthumously made to T-Sgt. Togo S. Sugiyama, who was killed in action on July 12, 1944, in Italy.

His father, Yasukichi Sugiyama, 15-9-A, received the award at the local M.P. station Tuesday.

Sgt. Sugiyama attended Polytechnic High School in Los Angeles, Calif., and worked as a clerk in a grocery store and a fish market.

He entered the army as a teleetee in August, 1941.

In a single day, Sugiyama killed five German machine-gunners near Bastina, Italy. He also killed three snipers, took one prisoner, and was credited with knocking out or routing four machine gun nests.

VETERANS & SOLDIERS PROPERTY EXEMPTION

Veterans and soldiers in service are exempt from taxes to the extent of \$1,000 in property value under the California State Constitution. This exemption extends to a soldier's widow, or if he leaves no widow, to his mother if she is a widow.

Application for the exemption must be made in person to the Assessor, or if unable to appear in person, write to the Assessor and explain why you cannot appear and ask him to send blank forms to be filled out by one who cannot appear. If the veteran does not own \$1,000 worth of property, the property of his wife may be claimed exempt to the extent of the balance.

Every house holder in California is entitled to 100 exemption on personal property. By a census are householders of California if they intend to return.

Hanford Boy Wins Silver Star

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY—T-Sgt. Masakazu Nishi, former Hanford, California farmer, whose father, Masajiro Nishi, resides at 10-10-F, was recently awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action. The presentation was made in a Fifth Army ceremony in Novi, Italy.

Nishi, who has served throughout the campaigns of the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team in Italy and France, received the decoration for action in the vicinity of Bruyeres, France.

The Citation reads:

RESETTLEMENT ASSISTANCE PROG.

Reassurance concerning aid to those who need more than temporary assistance was emphasized by the Welfare Section in a recent interview.

The Social Security Board through State and local departments of Welfare will continue to provide assistance except for minimum household equipment to those who will need continuing financial aid beyond the first adjustment period. This period is approximately one month from the date of departure from the Center. Those who require help extending beyond this period will be considered for as before.

In the case of those with emergency problems during and after this first month's adjustment (whether due to illness, unemployment or similar accidents) the Social Security Board will continue to provide assistance.

In succeeding issues of the OUTPOST there will be further explanations of important points in the new Resettlement Assistance Program.

When Technical Sergeant Nishi discovered two enemy troopers armed with automatic weapons on an observation tower, without regard for his personal safety, halted his advancing platoon and proceeded alone toward the tower. Cautiously maneuvering without being noticed, he advanced 75 yards to the enemy position and caught an enemy lieutenant and a sergeant by surprise.

Sergeant Nishi took them as prisoners, and upon questioning the lieutenant, obtained important information as to the enemy's position.

On another occasion when Company K had temporarily established a defensive position on a commanding ridge, the enemy counterattacked from the draw directly in front of Sgt.

SACRAMENTO—The first thing a guy looks for, after riding four days and three nights on a train, is a bath. And that is just what we did. Sixty of us finished the trip here, the other five having alighted at Denver and Ogden.

It was a long, grueling trip, but it proved to be a lot of fun, too. It reminded me of that trip we took almost three years ago when we journeyed from Santa Anita to Rohwer. Only this one held more promise and, consequently, was far more enjoyable.

During the brief, one-and-a-half hour stopover in Denver, a couple of old friends met me at the station and drove some of us down to the mile-high city's crowded Japanese town. It bore a faint resemblance to Los Angeles' late, lamented Little Tokyo.

Some of the store names were even the same, such as the Manshu Low and the Mikawa-ya. And there were the sushi-ya's, pool halls, drug stores, and all the other kinds of stores that dotted L.A.'s Nipponese town. But somehow, the sight of this new Little Tokyo failed to stir any nostalgic memories in me. Perhaps it was because it was in a different setting. Perhaps it was because the faces were different.

But I suspect it was because I had just come from a government-made Little Tokyo and was inwardly rebelling at the idea of any more Nipponese-made Little Tokyos on the "outside" where we didn't have to live like that.

Ogden was a little bit different. There aren't enough Japanese to form a colony there, although there are a few in business there. Dr. Mike Horii, former Los Angeles dentist, has been practicing there for two and a half years. A few of us sauntered into the nearest lunch counter we could find, and found that it was open.

ROHWER HIGH RECEIVES A RATING

Rohwer High School was again accredited with an "A" rating for the school term of 1944-45 by the Arkansas State Department of Education, according to a report from the Education Section.

NISEI PW RETURNS HOME

His cheeks still hollow and faintly shadowed, Pfc. Harry H. Kuroiwa of 25-9-C was back with his wife and family today after seven months in a German Prison Camp. He was captured along with four companions in a 442nd anti-tank platoon when they were trying to carry their seriously wounded commanding officer back to the aid station during a battle near Bruyeros, France.

This was in Oct. 1944 and for the next seven months he was imprisoned in Moosburg Camp near the city of Munich. There were approximately thirty-six other Nisei soldiers in the camp and the Germans constantly subjected them to questioning since they could not seem to believe those were Americans serving with the U.S. Army. Pfc. Kuroiwa says with a smile that he tried to explain that he was born and brought up in this country and he was fighting in its army just the same way the Germans were fighting in theirs.

When asked about food he replied simply that it was very poor, that for dinner they received a bowl of so-called soup consisting of a few potatoes, microscopic pieces of meat, and much water. This was all except for a loaf of bread which had to serve seven or eight men for both supper and breakfast.

They were expected to work and were transported to Munich by box car for this purpose. Those who did not want to work and who were not seriously ill were routed out by vicious police dogs. We asked the Pfc. if he ever saw any of the men bitten but he said that they never waited to find out whether the dogs would actually attack -- that the threat was enough. For beds they had platforms about three by six feet with straw strewn on top. This was for two men who therefore had to sleep in cramped positions all night if they slept at

 Nishi's platoon sector. "Dispersing" that an enemy tank was the main threat of the counterattack, Sergeant Nishi placed his bazooka man in a vantage position while he moved to another point 25 yards from his comrade, and, calmly exposing himself without



regard for his personal safety, fired at the oncoming tank with his Thompson submachine gun.

"He kept up his fire to protect his comrades until his bazooka man was able to stop the tank and force the enemy to withdraw.

"Technical Sgt. Nishi's leadership, courage and devotion to his fellowmen are exemplary and a credit to the armed forces of the United States."

Nishi entered the service from Hanford, on February 16, 1942 and joined the 442nd Combat Team in February 1942.

In addition to the Silver Star, Nishi wears the Purple Heart with two Oak Leaf Clusters, Good Conduct Medal, the Combat Infantryman Badge and four battle participation stars.

 But I did recall that memorable September night early three years ago when the special train transporting us to Arkansas crossed the California state line into Arizona. It was 11:30 at night, if I remember correctly, and the heavens were bright with what seemed like thousands of stars. The stars seemed so close that I felt I could almost reach up and pluck a few of them right out of the sky.

This time, however, when we were returning after almost three years of wartime exile, it was dawn, and the sun was rising. Maybe I am a bit oversentimental, or perhaps I am what the boys call "symbolic conscious."

But I like to think of that as a good omen for our life anew in the erstwhile Golden State. Perhaps our returning will mean the dawn of a new life for us Japanese-Americans in California. Perhaps the evacuation, the subsequent resettlement, and the educational campaign carried out by the WRA and other American friends, will have brought that about.

If so, the evacuation and its attendant losses will prove to have been a blessing in disguise.

 The German guards were tough but they did not abuse the prisoners in this particular camp. However during the last two weeks before the Americans broke through, Pfc. Kuroiwa and his fellow prisoner were made to sleep in box cars in a railroad yard each night. They also heard

that SS troops were coming to kill them before the advancing Americans arrived. They decided that the Germans were hoping that American planes would bomb the railroad yard and save the SS troops the trouble.

But the famous 20th Armored Division moved too fast for the ferries and the first week in May saw Pfc. Kuroiwa and his comrades back under U.S. control.

When asked whether or not he received his Red Cross packages he replied that they came through regularly and were a great help. The men saved their chocolate, cigarettes, cheese and soap and traded them for more bread and potatoes. The soap could be spared since there was only one shower for the entire camp and they were able to use it only once a month.

After a sixty day furlough, Pfc. Kuroiwa will go to Hot Springs for reassignment.
