THREE UNITS TO CLOSE BY OCT. 1 POSTON 2, 3 AND CANAL GIVEN NOTICE

Dillon S. Myer, WRA Director, announced yesterday the early closing of Units 2 and 3 at Poston and the Canal Unit at Gila, Arizona.

In the message accompanying the announcement Mr. Myer said, "after weighing the convenience to the present residents of continued operation of these smaller units until the closing date for the two centers, as a whole, against the benefits the residents will receive from early relocation and the administrative difficulties involved in keeping these units open, I have decided that Units 2 and 3 of the Colorado River Center and Canal Unit of the Gila River Center should be closed to evacuee occupancy not later than Oct. 1, 1945. This is a suitable time, I believe, to re-examine the status of our entire relocation program. We have six and one-half months left before final center closure.

We would like to set up a schedule by which the several centers will be closed on successive dates instead of being kept open until Dec. 31. This seems to us highly desirable for the following reasons:

CONDITIONS FAVORABLE

"First of all, I believe everyone will agree that conditions will be much more favorable to relocation during July, August, and September than during October, November, and December. Housing is a problem in virtually every relocation district. The housing problem can be met better during the summer months than during the fall and winter. The transportation problem will be more acute in the last three months of this year than during the rest of the summer. In addition to the needs created by the military situation, there will be additional seasonal demands on the transportation system by Christmas mail and holiday traffic during the last two months of the year. Further, while I do not expect that the evacuees will experience any serious difficulties in obtaining jobs during the last three months of the year, it is true that normally jobs are more plentiful during the summer than during the winter months. Also, war cutbacks are beginning to be made, which will progressively make the employment situation less

RELOCATEES ASKED TO WATCH FOR FREIGHT

There have been quite a few instances of persons who have relocated, not being at home when their furniture was delivered. When you receive notice from the railroad company that your freight has arrived, you are asked to make arrangements to have someone stay at home until the freight is delivered so there will be someone to receive it. If you change your address before the freight arrives, be sure to leave a forwarding address so that the Bill of Lading and notice of arrival of the freight may be forwarded to your new address.

IKEMOTO EARNS WINGS AND BOOTS

Pvt. Teo E. Ikemoto, former Rohwer resident, whose father, J. Ikemoto, resides at 24-3-A, has won the right to wear the "Boots and Wings" of the United States Army Paratroops. He has completed four weeks of jump training during which time he made five jumps, including a tactical jump at night involving a combat problem on landing.

Pvt. Ikemoto has three brothers, Hank, overseas; Bill, Rohwer high graduate who is now in New York awaiting induction into the Army, and Sam, now in the Center. He also has two sisters, Yoshiko and Harumi.

RESETTLEMENT GRANTS

Of the three which are attempting to meet by means of the Resettlement Assistance Grants, the most important to most families will be the aid for buying household furnishings and equipment. But eligibility requirements are strict.

First of all, no grants can be made for unattached individuals and married couples without children. This is because these persons can live in furnished rooms. Two-person families where separate sleeping rooms are necessary, as in the case of brother and sister, may be given a grant if otherwise eligible.

Maximum grants for families of three members or more are as follows:

3-member family...	\$150.
4-member family...	\$200.
5-member family...	\$250.
6 or more family...	\$300.

No grant for this purpose can exceed \$500. There is no grant to a 2-member family; if necessary, the maximum amount is \$100.

In deciding on the size of the family, all persons who plan to live in one household, including family members already relocated, are counted.

For each wage earner over one, two members are deducted from the number in the family. A wage earner is any person between 18 and 65, except housewives (one to each household) full-time students and those

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LOS ANGELES--After three years, one month, and five days, I am back in the old home town. It is a grand feeling to be back. When I stepped off the crack streamliner, last night in the huge, lavish union station, I couldn't help thinking about that day morning three years ago, when we left the city in buses for Santa Anita.

At that time, we had all wondered when we would ever be able to return here. None of us had the slightest idea. Some thought it would happen a year or so. Some opined that it would be five years before we could set foot here again. Others thought it would be never.

Frankly, I didn't know. I remember when the caravan of buses passed the union station, the same union station where I detoured last night, someone in our bus said with a forced air of gaiety: "Take a good look at the place. We won't see it again for a long time."

I took a good look at it. I recall looking at the union station, new and beautiful and resplendent in its Spanish-styled architecture, and I recall remarking to a friend: "Some day I am going to come back here, and I am going to come back in a train, and get off in that station. And I am going to think about this day."

That is what I did. I thought about it when our train eased into the station, and I kept thinking about it as I slowly and deliberately walked down the exit lane between the rows of people. It gave me a sort of personal, childish satisfaction.

Instead of taking a taxi, we rode a street car to our destination. It even felt good to ride in a Los Angeles street car. You folks who have never seen or ridden in a local street car will not be able to

Our Rohwer IS men do a lot of extra chores such as answering ambulance calls in the middle of the night (due to the hospital ambulance shortage) and do delivering long distance calls and wires. More than that they have the delightful duty of reminding our visitors who overstay their thirty days that though we like to be hospitable and all that, still a rule is a rule and this is the road to the gate, thank you very much.

The two top-ranking men in the department in point of seniority are our genial cigar-smoking Chief, Bert Clayton, and energetic Roy Koyama of Block 8. Both came to the force in Sept. 1942 and have remained with it ever since. Chief Clayton was Asst. Chief under Lindsey Hatchett and later succeeded him.

The force includes 60 men who patrol districts made up of four blocks. High ranking officer is Captain Ted Oesto of Blk. 24 who is assisted by Lt. Sy Iayada of Blk. 23, and Sgts. Ray Okamoto of Blk. 8, Jack Tabata of Blk. 2, Bill Yoshioka of Blk. 12, and Fred Lasusaka of Blk. 19.

In spite of the unpleasant tasks which they must perform, the force has unusual stability and changes are few except for relocations.

Occasionally assignments meet with more enthusiasm, the high school carnival of last year for example was thoroughly patrolled by the entire department.

favorable for evacuees although it seems clear that the employment situation will be favorable for quite some time to come. Still further, the business of moving and making an adjustment in a new locality is more difficult in the winter months than it will be during the next three or four months.

REDUCTION OF STAFF

There are other factors which favor early relocation. At present, we have inadequate staff to handle several times the present weekly and monthly volume of relocation. We must recognize, however, that, as we come closer to the end of the year, we shall lose additional staff members, some of them key personnel. Consequently, the amount of assistance we shall be able to offer evacuees in the field and at the centers will diminish as time goes by.

APPROPRIATION CUT

Recently, we have been offered many fine group relocation opportunities both on the Pacific coast and in other areas. These group opportunities are available only if we can get a sufficiently large group relocation in a short period of time to make the employers feel justified in making such opportunities available.

The final consideration, of course, and the most important one, is the fact that Congress is now considering the appropriation it will make to the War Relocation Authority. I have (Continued on next page)

(Continued from Page 3) thirty-five and must have the respect and recommendation of the people in their blocks. They are trained in first aid, finger printing (one ex-member is now with a finger printing bureau in N.Y.C.), and are shown training films put out by the Arkansas State Police.

Rohwer's record in crime prevention, although perhaps not as startling as in fire prevention, is still very good when one considers the number of people here and the conditions under which we live. Chief Clayton ascribes this to the fine co-operation of the residents, and the friendly relationship existing between the department, the Community Council, the Block Managers, and the Judiciary Committee.

(Continued from Page 1) realized for some time that we could not reasonably expect the Congress to appropriate money for the maintenance of relocation centers beyond a reasonable period after the west coast exclusion ban was lifted....You (may) know that there was a good deal of opposition (in Congress) to our continuing our operations after July 1, of this year. We have succeeded in convincing the legislative, and administrative authorities of the government so far, that we were right in our belief that a full year of operation beyond the date of the lifting of the exclusion order was necessary.

LAST APPROPRIATION

"The House of Representatives has just passed an appropriation bill providing money to operate centers until Dec. 31, but did so only after it defeated by a small majority of only 18 votes an amendment that sought to reduce the amount of our appropriation by \$5,000,000 and which would have required CRA to wind up all its business by Jan. 1. I am convinced that we would have been unable to get even this slim majority of

MESA ORCHARD CO. WANT MEN

The Mesa Orchard Company at Posa, Idaho, where several people from this center have gone, has all the facilities it can take care of, but now housing is available for ten or fifteen single men for whom there is work.

The pay is \$0.60 an hour for all men and \$0.50 an hour for all women. During the apple-picking season wages are paid on a piece basis, and workers have made excellent wages far above the average hourly basis.

According to Ernest J. Palmer, relocation officer at Boise, Idaho, the Mesa Orchard people would be glad to have small families come out if they are interested in this year-round employment and are willing to accept the housing that is available. At the present time two-room shacks with a porch attached are available. The company states that they will furnish paint, celotex, and other repair equipment for making these shacks more livable. There is also a possibility of building a few four-room apartments for winter residence. The two-room shacks are being occupied by two or three evacuee families now, and have been repaired so they are quite livable.

RELOCATE SOON

"The larger the number of people who delay their departure from relocation centers, the tighter our budget situation will be. If there should be a sizable group within the Centers during the last two months, some of them may be almost stranded by lack of adequate transportation or by their failure to make adequate relocation plans earlier...A large scale movement during the winter season will place the last leavers among the evacuees in a very disadvantageous position in comparison to those who made earlier plans. We must be realistic about this and must recognize that a year is a long enough time in which to make the personal adjustments and plans required for relocation. Many thousands of evacuees have already shown that this can be done in much less than a year.

"In working out a schedule of closing the Centers on successive dates, we will, of course, live up to our commitment to give ninety days advance notice to the evacuees before closing any Center. We have interpreted that commitment to require us to give ninety days before closing Units 2 and 3 at Pocatello and the Canal Unit at Oila. That is why we have announced that we shall close those units by not later than Oct. 1."

Los Angeles is such a large, sprawling city that one needs a car to get around any place. You just can't ride the street cars and expect to cover much territory.

And right now, buying a car is a mighty expensive proposition.
