

## MONUMENT DEDICATION TOMORROW MORNING

## PFC NISHIMOTO RECEIVES MEDAL

Dedication of the monument erected at the Center cemetery south of Block 3 will be held tomorrow morning at 8:00. The tower, a memorial to the deceased of the Rohwer Relocation Center, was constructed by Kohelji Horizawa of Block 6. Horizawa used the lotus for his design, making the tower as in the midst of lotus blossoms shaped from the concrete which he used. The memorial bears several inscriptions, one by the Rev. Hayashima, which reads as follows:

At ceremonies held at Camp Robinson yesterday afternoon, a posthumous Silver Star for gallantry in action was awarded to the parents of Pfc. Joe M. Nishimoto. Mr. and Mrs. Nishimoto and their daughter Marie of 28-12-F received the award. Pfc. Nishimoto was killed on Nov. 14, 1944, during the campaign in France.

which he used. The memorial bears several inscriptions, one by the Rev. Hayashima, which reads as follows:

"To him who sleeps eternally here a descendant of glorious Yamato who came in his prime with hopes and ambitions heroic to battle the fortunes of life, peace and bliss be yours. (1944).

There is also an inscription asking the people of Arkansas to "keep in beauty and reverence this ground where our bodies sleep."

A vineyard operator in Fresno, California, Nishimoto graduated from the Washington Union High School there in 1938, was inducted in October of 1943 after relocating in Columbus, O. He was later stationed at Camp Shelby, Miss.

## OPEN HOBBY-SHOP ROOM FOR BOYS

The Community Activities section has announced the opening of a hobby-shop room for boys at 31-8-F. The room is in the charge of Byron Sprague, graduate student at Princeton University.

All boys between the ages of 9 and 12 who are interested in Cub scouting will be free to use the room. The room will be open each afternoon from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Boys may keep their collections, from snakes to stamps, in this room. They may do wood work, carving, sketching and painting. Groups will learn Cub scouting skills.

## RESETTLEMENT ASSISTANCE GRANTS

The last in the series of regular discussions of Resettlement Assistance Grants concerns the aid for the first month's rent and the transportation of personal property.

The rent schedule followed in establishing the amount of help to be given is based on the average rent paid by civilian renters in federally owned family dwelling projects operated under the FPHA. Grants in these projects are based on fair rental values for similar housing in the locality or are set at a low level which will yield an economic return to the government.

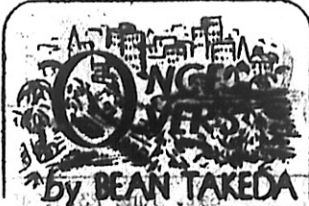
1 bedroom (3 persons) \$34 night hikes. Boys interested in using the room simply report to 31-8-F in the afternoon.

2 bedrooms (4 and 5) \$36.

3 bedrooms (6, etc.) \$39.

Grants may be made to those eligible for the purpose of transporting their personal property from the railway depot to their new home. Further information on this subject may be obtained from either Relocation or Welfare.

The check for the grant for temporary assistance is to be mailed to the District Relocation officer if the destination of the applicant is a community in which there is a District WRA Office. If there is no District WRA Office there, the check will be mailed to the applicant in care of General Delivery at his point of destination. Every effort will be made to have the check at the point of destination upon or before arrival of the applicant.



**LOS ANGELES**—In 1942, New York state had 32,000 more cars registered than California. Today the situation is reversed, and California has 27,000 more than the Empire state.. Black market gasoline is selling at 50 and 60 cents a gallon, with plenty of buyers. Imagine paying five bucks for 10 gallons. There is no shortage of gas here. Local dealers have their pumps brimming full. The shortage is in gas stamps.

Chicago gangsters are responsible for the local meat shortage. They flooded the city with ten million counterfeit red stamps, and the meat-hungry public cleaned out the meat counters with these bogus coupons. More than 200 meat markets, including those catering to the movie trade in Hollywood and Beverly Hills, are being investigated by OPA agents. There is also a decided shortage of eggs and poultry. And of course, butter is something that can be found only in the dictionaries.

Three hostels are in operation here, and all are jam-packed to the rafters. The Evergreen hostel, first to open, has nearly 100 evacuees. Senshin gukuen has 33, while the Japanese Methodist church, which just opened last week, has nearly as many. The Nishi Hongwanji temple, focal point of a court battle early in the year, is taking in roomers at 50 cents a night, with no meals, but is not operating as a hostel.

Wara Chief Paul Robertson estimates that more than 911 evacuees have returned to Los Angeles county since the first of the year. There are probably many more, since they are not required to notify the WRA office of their arrival. About 1150 in all are lying in the area, which takes in Santa Barbara to the north and San Diego (Continued on next column)

"People told me there would be trouble," Mrs. Kai says. "But no. Except that the OPA won't let me raise rents. I got only \$3 and \$3.50 a week for rooms. There are 50 rooms in the hotel, but maybe OPA keeps all rents down for everyone."

think Detroit and Cleveland are bad, you should see this place. There just isn't any housing to be had. People are living under bridges, any place they can find space. Even single rooms are impossible to find. Unless some way is found to conquer this problem, it will be folly for any more evacuees to return here.

Los Angeles has changed quite a bit in the three years since the evacuation. Biggest change is in the makeup of its population. Close to a half million people have come to the city from the south and the mid west. The Negro population, for instance, has doubled. There are now 150,000 Negroes living in the city, as compared to 75,000 before. Most of them have moved into three of the former Japanese districts, Boyle Heights, Little Tokyo, and Westside Normandie district.

Mr. and Mrs. K. Ozaki (he was the former sound man for the Bohrer CA) have returned to their pre-evacuation barber shop and are again doing business at the same old stand. Barber prices seem to be uniform all over the city, dollar for a haircut, 75 cents for a shave. I think I'll practice cutting my own hair.
