To Take Emergency Cases Only

HOTEL IN PITTS. ANNOUNCES OPENING

The opening of the Pittsburgh Hostel was announced this week by Dr. John G. Smith, chairman of the Pittsburgh Citizens Resettlement Committee, and Clyde Atford, chairman of the Housing Sub-Committee.

Formerly a children's home, this building has facilities for immediate housing of from twelve to fifteen families.

The usual hostel rates will prevail. One dollar a day for rooms and board will be the charge for an adult; fifty cents per day for children. These rates apply during the period of temporary hostel residence. There will be a slight advance after employment is secured.

Housing is available in Pittsburgh at reasonable rentals and families in temporary residence at the hostel have a reasonable assurance of securing the type of residence they desire after employment is found.

Lab Technicians Wanted 2209 NISEI SOLDIERS RESCUE ARKANSAN

Jobs for medical laboratory technicians who are licensed in California are offered from St. Mary's Hospital in San Francisco, for \$150 to \$200 a month. There is also an opening for a student medical laboratory technician for a properly qualified person desiring to learn the trade. They prefer a girl with a college background in sciences. Some laboratory experience is desired.

COUPLE WANTED AT NEWARK, NEW JERSEY

There is a domestic offer in Newark, New Jersey, for a couple. The wages are \$250 per month with one day off each week. If the husband wishes to live with his wife and work outside, the wife will receive \$25 per week and board for the husband also. There is a small separate apartment for the couple. Newark is not very far from New York City. Any man wishing to apply for this offer should come to the Relocation Office, 42-2-E.

DOMESTIC JOBS OPEN IN CALIFORNIA

Thirty-nine domestic offers have just been received from California by the Relocation Office. They are from Los Angeles, Glendale, Hollywood, Flintridge, Arcadia, and many other places on the coast.

Since housing is so difficult to obtain, it seems that one of the best ways to rehabilitate oneself on the west coast is to accept a domestic offer and thus provide a home and job.

Some of these jobs allow as many as two or three children. The salaries range from \$80 a month with full maintenance to \$150 for a single person. There are several offers where the wife can work as a domestic and where her husband can live with her rent-free. Salaries for couples run as high as \$250 plus full maintenance. Many attractive farm offers are also received from California.

Those interested should contact C. B. Price, at the Relocation Office.

They might take a high school graduate with medical laboratory experience.

The starting wage is \$150 per month, 48 hours per week. The normal apprentice period is three years' experience with

high school graduation or one year's experience if science major with B.S. in science from college.

There is also a job for an X-ray technician, who must be a girl, and with experience. The wages are \$175 to \$210 per month, depending on experience, 48 hours per week.

There is also a job offered for a girl with a classical music background to work in a music store at \$1.00 an hour. The wages may be raised at any time that the results warrant the raise.

Three or four nights a week the girl may have to work three or four hours at night. On such occasions, she will not report until noon the next day.

GIVE MORE INFO ON MARTIN BOX FACTORY

More information has been received about the Martin Box Factory, Aurora, Indiana. Aurora is a small town, but close to many large cities. It is a forty-five minute ride, for instance, to Cincinnati. Toledo is the home of the Martin Brothers Box Company, but one of the largest offices is at Aurora.

The National Housing Agency has agreed to lend trailer camps to house the families that want to go there until their building program is completed. They have priorities for building houses for families.

The company employs both men and women. The plant runs on an incentive basis—there is a standard rate of production established. For example, if an employee gets 45% over the standard amount of production, he would then receive 145% of his hourly rate. Martin stated that any good worker could get more than his standard salary. The pay ranges between 60 and 90¢ an hour.

According to a recent issue of the PACIFIC CITY ZEN, an Army officer from Elverna, Arkansas, was rescued by two Nisei soldiers during the last heavy fighting in Italy.

Captain Joseph W. Hill, commanding officer of a 2nd Battalion rifle company, was returning from a reconnaissance trip with one of his platoon leaders when they were surprised by a lone Jerry.

The captain knew some of his men would be coming, so he attempted to persuade the German to surrender.

This failed and the two officers were on the verge of being led away when Pfc. Mas Tamura and Pfc. Toshio Tsukiyama came along. They got the drop on the Jerry and captured him.

Pfc. Tamura's parents are at Minidoka while Tsukiyama is from Hilo, Hawaii.
