

In discussing the possibility of another special train this month, Project Director Ray D. Johnston said: "A recent survey shows that many center residents plan to relocate during the latter part of September. Departure dates are scattered, however, and we must have more definite information before we can justify a request for another train. Since the Washington Office must have at least two weeks advance notice before a train can be obtained it

will be necessary for center residents to come in and sign up immediately if the railroad equipment is to be made available for our use in September.

If a sufficient number of passengers register soon enough, another September train is possible. If only a few sign up or even if a large number sign, but wait too late to do so, another train will not be available this month. Whether center residents travel by special train or not, depends on a prompt and definite indication of their wishes."

ARMY CARCELS EXCLUSION NOTICES

The following teletype from WRA Director Myer was received here Tuesday:

"The War Department and the Western Defense Command have just announced that all individual exclusion orders heretofore issued by Western Defense Command are rescinded effective Sept. 4 at midnight, Pacific War Time. All centers will cease to be military areas at same time. Military Police will be removed at same time from all centers other than Tule Lake. At Tule Lake the Military Police will continue beyond midnight only as special agents of Department of Justice to enforce detention at Tule Lake of those persons designated by Justice Department for detention."

Project Director Johnston said that detailed information concerning the action of the War Department would be available within a short time.

Coast Guard Restrictions on Nisei Lifted
The following teletype was recently received from

the Washington Office:

"Effective with formal surrender of Japan the Commandant of the Coast Guard has revoked all special wartime restrictions and clearance procedures especially applicable to employment of U. S. Citizens of Japanese descent on water-front facilities and vessels. They are subject hereafter only to the same locally determined requirements applicable to all citizens operating on waterfront facilities and vessels in peace time. Representations now being made to Navy to rescind restrictions on Japanese nationals.

Hiss Sumiye Tashiro has succeeded Mrs. Sa ai and is now in charge of the Hostel. The Hostel will work in cooperation with the W. R. ation had its hostel at 1426 North Prespect Avenue ready for occupancy on September 1, it was announced this week by Justus Olson, Association President. The large three-story graystone house, containing over 20 rooms and surrounded by a large rard, is located on a hill overlooking Lake Michigan, about five minutes by bus from the heart of downtown Milwaukec.

The building, now being operated as a boarding house, has a kitchen, dining room with scating capacity for 30 persons, living room, three bathrooms, washroom, shower room, laundry and approxim tely 15 sleeping rooms of varying size, the largest of which will easily accommodate five persons. There is telephone service on each floor. The house is heated by steam, with separate facilities for heating hot water. There is modern equipment in the laundry and the kitchen.

The tentative rate schedule calls for \$1 a day for unemployed adults and \$1.50 for employed. Rates for children under 8 will be 50¢ a day each for those whose parents are unemployed and 75¢ for children of employed parents. Reservations for the hostel may be made through the Relocation Program Officer of ur project, who will in turn communicate with the Hilwaukee WRA Officer, Mr. Joseph H. Columbus, Ohio - The Friends sponsored Columbus Hostel opened for family occupancy in September 1. The Hostel is located at 627 South Lazelle Street.

It has a fully equipped kitchen, a dining room, a large living room, bathroom and two large bedrooms. The Hostel is comfortably furnished and is newly papered and painted. It will accommodate two large or three small families until permanent arrangements can be made for living quarters. Rates of \$5.00 a week will be charged for a family unit. Families will do their own cooking and furnish their own food.
