CLOSING PLANS ANNOUNCED BY PROJECT DIRECTOR

The following statement by Ray D. Johnston, Project Director, gives the latest information concerning the closing plans for this Center.

"The ROHWER RELOCATOR in the issue of

August 14, 1945 printed ADMINISTRATIVE NOTICE NO. 289. This statement outlined the procedure for the orderly closing of the centers on the dates established. The closing of this center on cr before December 15, 1945 is an established fact and our concern as we approach the coming two months' period is to plan so as to assure the movement of the remaining people with a minimum of inconvenience to the families and a maximum

utilization of available transportation."

"It is obvious in planning for terminal departures that the number leaving on any one day or in any one week must not be so great as to over-burden railroad facilities. It appears desirable that, in so far as possible, departures to particular localities should be grouped so as to take advantage of special coaches - this applies to groups noving north and east as well as those returning to the west coast area. By the lst of December, railroad transportation will be limited by the starting of holiday travel. It is essential, therefore, that all departures other than those persons awaiting approval by curside welfare agencies of clfare assistance plans be scheduled to leave prior to November 30th."

"For many individuals and families housing has appeared as a problem. The closing of the unit's at the Colorado River and Gila River Relocation Centers prior to the scheduled date shows that those needing housing have found it available at their destinations. It is urged that those family representatives who are confronted with a lack of housing at their first choice destinations consider the advisability of changing to their second or third choice destinations. It is pointed out that the Center is going to close on or be-fore December 15th and, if a family can relocate in some nen-west coast location, it is better to do so than to be scheduled for transportation to a west coast destina-tion with the necessity for making final arrangements subsequent to arrival at that destination."

"Establishment of daily and weekly quotas will be made as of October 22nd to be effective not later than November 5th. Those persons who have not processed by October 22nd for departure will be considered in the scheduling program. In determining the dates of departure and destinations for scheduled families, certain general principles will be taken into consideration: the expressed choice of the family representative unless this choice is everbalanced in importance by other factors; special problems which night condition the capacity of the family members to travel at any particular time or which might condition the reception at the point of destination; grouping of families in order to take advantage of special transportation. These and other principles will be used as individual and group situations arise,"

"It shall be the project policy to schedule

departures to insure as much consideration as possible for the interests of the families. It must be born in mind, however, that the scheduling cannot be suited to the whim of every individual family representative. Individual concessions must be made in order that the interests of the entire group may be not. The cooperation of all is essential to the successful conclusion of this final phase of the releastion program.

SPECIAL COACH FOR CHICAGO, OCT. 23

The departure of a special coach for Chicago on October 23 was announced today. The coach will leave McGenee at 8:30 p.m. on that date and is scheduled to arrive in Chicago at 2:08 p.m. October 24. All persons interested in traveling to Chicago or points in the North and East on or near that date should make arrangements now with the Relocation Office. GRANADA TO CLOSE ON SCHEDULE

The second and largest all-Granada Rail-road train took 578 Amache residents back to their Califernia homes October 2. Scheduled to close October 15, and the first to be emptied of residents, the center had only 844 evacues still living on the project after the departure of the train. At its peak population, three years ago this month, the Colorado Center had 7,565 residents.

The largest groups headed for a single locality were - 149 to Los Angeles, 87 to Sacramento and 63 to Sebastopol. Other destinations for groups larger than 19 returnes were, Colusa, Livingston, Maryville, Petalumna, San Francisco, Santa Rose, Walnut Grove and Yuba City.

The first entire train, returning evacuees to coast homes from Amache, left on September 22, carrying 422 passengers. Other group transportation arrangements have been by specially chartered coaches on regularly scheduled trains, both Eastbound and Vestbound.

KOHWLE RESIDENTS INVESTIGATE WILSON PLANTATION

Mr. Walter Atsumi, Block 34, Mr. Eiichiro Matsumoto, Block 41, Mr. Y. Suzuki, Block 38, Mr. Hideji Yakushiji, Block 8, and Mr. Haruji Sato, Block 40 left Rohwer Tuesday with Mr. Ab Ragon, Little Rock Relocation Officer, to investigate relocation opportunities at Wilson Plantation where thirty eight evacuees have already resettled. Most of these are from Poston but one family is from Gila.

One Poston resident, Masno Sano, came to, Wilson in August on an inspection trip and liked the place so well he did not return to the center but had his family join him immediately. He sent the following telegram back to Poston: -

August 27, 1945

To:

Mr. T. Sumida Block Manager Colorado River Relocation Center Poston, Arizona

This is to advise that I found Wilson Plantation exactly as presented by Mr. Ragon. I am well pleased with whole situation and I recommend it to all other evacuee farmers. I am going to stay here. Have wired my family to leave Center about September 15 to relocate with me on Wilson Plantation.----

SLPTEMBLE PAY ON OCTOBLE 15 AND 18

Rohwer - It was recently announced by Mr. Halph Estes, Project Finance Officer, that, beginning with payments for September, evacues wags will be paid in cash. Payments will be made in the Canteen

Mess workers were paid last Thursday in Mess Halls 12 and 20 but will be paid in the future in the canteen building. Mr. Estes warned that all workers rust bring with them their assignment slips or other positive means of identification when they come up to be paid.

YOKOHAMA SPECIE BANK PAYIENTS TO START SOON

Washington, D.C. - Evacues having accounts with the Yokchana Specie Bank are new advised that first dividend payments may start not leng after October 1, 1945, according to word received here today from George H. Mills, who is liquidating the bank under the direction of the Cormissioner of Banking of the State of California. Evacues are asked to discentinue writing letters of inquiry regarding payment, since the time and mency involved in answering then will affect the anount of dividends payable.

In addition, Mr. Mills suggests that claims should be made as soon as possible. He estimates that to date only about 50 percent of the depositors have filed claims. Continued delay in filing may slow up liquidation and payment of dividends. Claims are to be filed with the Commissioner of Banking, State of California, San Francisco.

NLW RELOCATION INFORMATION

Japanese language editions of two English paraphlets previously distributed - "Business Opportunities for Issei in Washington", and "Philadelphia, the City for Family Relocation", are now available at all ness halls still serving meals and at the Relocation Office.

With these pamphlets there is also a report in Japanese on business enterprises operated by Japanese-Americans in Chicago. This report is the result of a survey made by Mr. Shetaro Hikida, formerly of Gila River and San Francisco. Mr. Hikida will make additional reports on business opportunities in other Micwest Cities.

HOW TO CLT SCHOOL CREDITS

Robust - All graduates of the Center High School and all other students who relocated before January 1, 1945 should send requests for transcripts of credits to W.R.A. Education Section, Barr Building, Washington, D.C. until March 30, 1946. After that time such requests should be addressed to: Commissioner of Education, U.S. Office of Education, Washington, D.C.

Students relocating since January 1, 1945 can get their transcripts from the project until Nev. 1. After that time transcripts can be obtained as described

above.
