INTERNEES: P.O. ROUTING RULES CHANGED

The Social counseling service section has received communications from the Councilor General of Spain indicating the proper way to address and route mail to internees.

The censorship of incoming domestic internee letters may be expedited by forwarding them to New York before being sent to an internment camp. Postage stamps are not required.

The name and return address of the sender should be placed in the upper left-hand corner of the envelope. The term "prisoner of War Mail-Free" should be placed in the upper-right-hand corner.

The name and serial number of the internee, the name of his camp (but not the location of the camp) and a "Box 20, General Post Office, New York, New York" should be placed in the center and lower half of the envelope.

BOY SCOUT FIELD DAY COMMEMORATES ANNIVERSARY

Rohwer Boy scouts will open their Field day commemorating the 33rd National Boy Scout week at 1:45 p.m. today on the high school athletic field. Troops from Monticello and McGehee will take part in the celebration.

Following the call to assembly by Norman Shimakawa and presentation of colors by John Shimakawa, welcoming messages will be extended by Ray D. Johnston, Project director, and Dr. J. B. Hunter, director of Community Services.

As the highlight of the afternoon, scouts will compete in the Field day events which include knot tying, first aid, flint and steel, fire building, Morse Code and Semaphore signalings, uniform race and signal tower race. Kats Nagai will be the official announcer; Tom Tautsami, Ted Chashi and George Suzuki, timekeepers. Judges will

CO-OP TO USE COUPONS \$2.50 And \$5.00 Books On Sale; Refund Basis Revealed

Beginning Monday, nothing but coupons will be valid at the canteen. Cash transactions will be used only at the shoe store, mail order unit and newspaper subscriptions.

Coupon books in denominations of \$2.50 and \$5.00 will be on sale at the block offices 5, 9, 15, 28, 38 and 41. The offices will sell books from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon and 1:30 to 3 p.m.

Coupons will also be sold at the canteen shortly. Coupon books will not be sold to anyone under 18 years. Those under 18 must secure coupons from older members of their family.

SHOE SALES SUSPENDED

Until the arrival of a representative from the State ration board, there will be no sales of shoes without ration tickets.

Since no one in the Center has ration book number 1, some satisfactory substitute plan will be worked out to enable residents to buy footwear.

Soft-soled slippers will not be rationed. Each person will be entitled to three pairs a year.

Empty coupon books must be turned in on dates to be announced later. Patronage refunds will be based only on the empty books checked in.

"Inasmuch as no record of the individual's purchases has been kept it becomes necessary to put into effect this system in order to keep the patron's record and exempt payment of income taxes on the profits made during the present unrecorded period," states an official co-op release.

INCOME TAX FORMS ARRIVE

Federal and California income tax return forms and corporation tax forms have arrived at the Legal Aid office. Aid will be given to residents in filling out the returns.

Federal income tax forms must be in by March 15 and the California returns by April 15.
