Aording to Congressman W. F. Norrell, needed repairs on Highway No. 1, the road from McGehee to Rohwer, will be made through a directive issued by the Secretary of War.

## NEW SIGN-UP METHOD

### Revised Schedule to Speed Registration; Q28 Changed

Under the revised method of registration, three blocks will be covered in a day. The interviewers will be divided into three groups and each will begin at 8:30 a.m. and stay until the registration is completed in their respective mess halls.

Today registration will be at Blocks 7, 10 and 23. Thereafter, the schedule will be as follows: Thursday--Blocks 8, 24, (9); Friday--26, 38, (25); Saturday--39, 41, (40); Monday--34, 32, (33); Tuesday--27, 20, (28); and Wednesday--19, 29, (17).

A meeting will be held the night before registration at 7:30 o'clock in the last named block in parentheses in each series. In Block 33 the meeting will be held on Sunday night.

In order to alleviate confusion the term "application" has been changed to "information for leave clearance." Registrants are under no obligation to leave the Center after receiving their clearance.

Question 28 in Form 126 for aliens has been changed to read, "Will you swear to abide by the laws of the United States and to take no action which would in any way interfere with the war effort of the United States?"

## DISTRICT WORKER PLAN ADOPTED

Instead of individual block laborers the Center will now be divided into six districts, announced the Public Works division. Each section will have a district engineer who will be in direct charge of all work within his zone.

The maximum of six men will be allowed from each block, making a total of 36 men within a district. These workers may be shifted from one block to another within their particular zones, but they will not have to go outside their section.

This new arrangement will enable the district engineer to shift his workers around to obtain the best result. It will also help out those blocks who are unable to find sufficient laborers to do their own work.

Blocks 1, 2, 15, 16, 17 and 29 form District 1; Blocks 3, 4, 5, 12, 13 and 14, District 2; Blocks 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11, District 3.

## Vigilance in Handling All Fire Hazards Requested by Miller

"Outside fires used for boiling wood and roots are being left burning at night unattended. This practice must be stopped at once as a high wind would endanger buildings and property.

"Ashes from stoves should be carried to outside areas of blocks to be emptied because of the danger of live coals being left in ashes to be blown about, thereby creating a serious fire hazard.

"Inflammable materials such as wood, kindling and paper boxes should not be kept closer to stoves than the concrete base on which the stove sits."

## EDITORIAL

## THE WAR AND RATIONING

Wars -- cursed afflictions known to all generations -- may be said to be caused by the failure of humanity to recognize the attestations of idealistic democracy.

Era upon era, century upon century and even decades upon decades, these gangrenous undergrowths, bred by racial animosity and blind individualism, have built up obstructions to progress and have turned to red the 'green light' in all fields--whether it be political, social or economical.

America and the world today faces another plague, ever ready to sap all worldly resources, decimate populations and undermine culture. On widespread carnage fields stringing from bomb-torn Kharkov to the shark-infested South Seas, a battle for Four Freedoms is being fought.

But wartime liabilities are not only marked "expedient" in men, munitions and materials.

On the home fronts, it means personal sacrifices through long hours, less pleasure and stringent rationing.

The relocation centers, contrary to fallacious rumors, have not been left out in making personal sacrifices. Here and in nine other similar projects, residents who have seen their life work disappear before their eyes are working at various tasks, earning \$12, \$16 or \$19 per month.

Rationing here is just as stringent as those faced by citizens on the outside and even more so since goods not as yet rationed are difficult to obtain in the centers. We have sugar and coffee rations; we have our meatless days and rationed oleomargarine; and we feel the pinch of shoe-rationing.

We in Rohwer have notched up our belts to meet this shortage, but the war may not end tomorrow or the day after; so we are prepared to tighten up our belts with the rest of the Americans.

## GUNS SEIZED MAY GO TO WAR USE

Editor's note: The following story is from the San Francisco Chronicle of Feb. 7 and was written by Jerry Wallace.

Guns and ammunition for home defense can be obtained in a way as yet untried. That way is similar to the one whereby automobile tires, too, can be made available for loyal citizens in California. It is to take the property of the Japanese who have been interned.

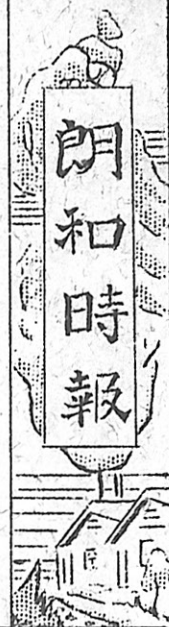
Reasons even more cogent can be advanced for doing this in the case of firearms and cartridges than in the case of automobile

equipment. Why should good guns be allowed to rust and deteriorate in storage when members of the State Militia, Civilian Defense units and high school cadets need them? We recognize that many of the guns taken from the Japanese resident in this country are not suitable for men in our regular armed services. Some of them, though, are Springfield and were in serviceable condition when seized. They might well be inspected, cleaned, oiled and placed en route to the combat fronts.

Some people think the

guns which the Japanese accumulated were "junk." Such persons do not know their penchant for getting the best obtainable. We have personally seen mighty expensive rifles and pistols in their possession. Was it just by accident that they adopted the procedure of buying firearms which would do execution at long distances instead of "scatter guns" of shorter effective range?

Can this property be taken by the Government and used for such purposes in time of war? If we read our books correctly in law school, it can.
