MAIL ORDER HOUSE ISSUES INFO ON RATIONED SHOES

According to latest information, shoes may be bought from mail order houses by simply attaching War Ration stamp No. 17 to the regular order.

Soft and hard-soled house slippers, infants' soft-soled shoes and rubber footwear, such as arotics, gaiters, work, dress and toe rubbers require no stamp.

The following questions and answers were taken from a bulletin released by Sears, Roebuck and Co.:

QUESTION: Can I buy rationed shoes by mail? How?
ANSWER: Yes. Tear out War Ration stamp No. 17 from your War Ration book No. 1 (sugar and coffee).

Q. Am I allowed to tear WR stamp No. 17 out of WR book No. 1? A. Yes. Send in stamp No. 17 only, not the whole book. Even though the WR book states, "void if detached," under the shoe rationing order, the

First Spring Crop Now Planted ; Agricultural Advisory Board Named

With the initial planting of the onion crop yesterday, the Center's agricultural production program geared itself for the first farming season in Arkansas.

To date approximately 125 acres have been ploughed. This will be used to grow onions, potatoes, peas, cabbage, spinach and daikon--crops that require immediate attention.

The major crop will be soy beans, corn and sweet potatoes. In all, approximately 35 different vegetables and melons are scheduled for planting before the season is over. Seeds for the farm program will also be grown. Location for seed beds are now being studied.

WATER STILL CONTAMINATED

Pending the report from the State Board of Health on the water samples taken from this Center, residents have been cautioned to drink boiled water only, by L. A. May, Project steward.

Warning is repeated constantly as numerous diarrhea cases have been reported and complaints that some messes are neglecting to boil water have been received by the mess division.

At present the plans call for enough production to meet the immediate needs of the Center only. Later this may be broadened to include other relocation centers.

Thursday at a general meeting of the agricultural group Jensuke Kanegaye was elected general supervisor; Frank Nishikawa and Gunji Asawa, assistant supervisors of gardening; Jaek Y. Matsumoto and Charles Takeuchi, assistant supervisors of equipment.

The following persons were chosen for the advisory board: Sonejiro Mogi, Wataru Dobashi, Kichinosuke Ikezoe, Shonosuke Matsuno, Hanji Inouye, Sakujiro Watanabe, Jitsuro Hiramoto and Shoki-ohi Ishimaru.

The residents of the Center were urged to bring any Tokinashi daikon and gobo seeds they could spare to Kanegaye, 40-9-C.

(Continued from page 1) government permits holders of WR book No. 1 to tear out WR stamp No. 17 when buying rationed shoes by mail.

Q. Do I need to send in a WR stamp when returning shoes for an exchange? A. No.

Q. Is WR stamp 17 transferable? A. Yes, among members of the same household. For example, mothers and fathers can use their WR stamps to provide extra shoes for their children.

Q. How long may I use WR stamp No. 17 in ordering shoes? A. Until June 15, 1943, after which date a new procedure will be given.

Arrangements are being made with the State rationing board to permit residents of the Center to buy shoes.

Chairmen for the exhibition were Izumi and Dr. Onizuka.

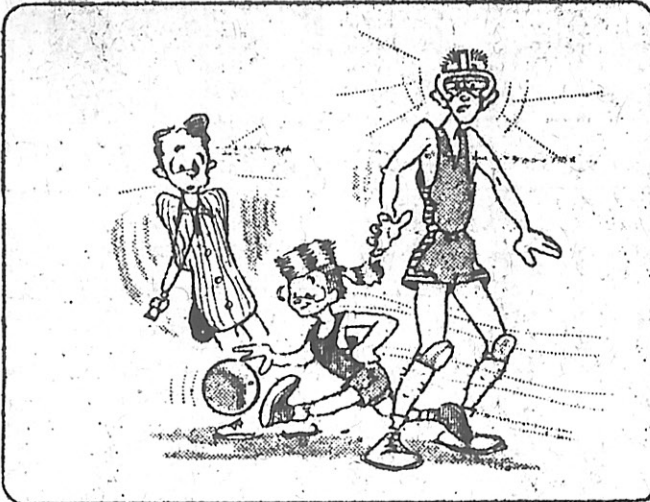

EDITORIAL OUR ACT

It was Shakespeare who said that the world is but a stage and we are but actors who stroll across this stage of life amid joy and sorrow. The dramatic heart-breaks, the cheerful episodes of the past and the future are the realities that we feel.

Today, that theatre of life is filled with clanging echoes of a world at war. In the chaotic confusion, many have died and many more will play their last acts on earth. And many will suffer and numerous will be the calls for salvation as the play runs on to another act—another.

We have not been left out of that great drama though the bit that we have played has gone unnoticed. But the contrast between our former lives and now is very great, and we have not been impervious to darts of ignorance and prejudice.

There may be significance in Ralph W. Sockman's idea, "Each of us needs a philosophy of life adequate to furnish a pattern for a world that is now jumbled like the pieces of a jigsaw puzzle. While none of us knows where she will be tomorrow, every one of us over twelve years of age should know what kind of person she desires to be tomorrow, and twenty years from now. However, the war has upset things, it has not changed the goals of the good life. Let us look for clues to life's larger meaning."

Perhaps there is more truth than rationalization in Sockman's words. "Quiet fortitude which can keep back the tears is worth as much as brilliant daring which brings the cheers."
