INFO ON MAIL ORDER SHOES November Allowances to be Paid From Today; Blocks 2,3,14 First

According to a bulletin released by Montgomery Ward, the Rohwer cooperative mail order department will be able to obtain shoes by attaching War stamp No. 17 to the regular order.

In addition to the regulations regarding mail orders, in the last issue of the OUTPOST, the following additional information was noted.

The stamp will be returned if the shoes are not available.

Athletic clubs and teams may be able to obtain special certificates from the local rationing board authorizing the purchase of athletic shoes, such as baseball and track shoes, without using the player's own ration stamps.

Special certificates are also required for long rubber boots, stated the bulletin.

CENTER RATIONING BOARD FORMED

In the first step toward the solution of the shoe problem, the formation of a Center rationing board was announced Monday.

The members are J. P. Raines, assistant Project director, J. S. Curtis, Project attorney and J. L. Parker of the county rationing board.

The purpose of the

board will be to furnish War Ration stamp No. 17 to the residents. This will be accomplished either by gathering the surrendered ration books from the assembly centers or by the issuance of skeleton books with only stamp No. 17 in it.

They will also receive applications for War Ration

books No. 1 and 2 for persons applying for leave clearance. These books will be given to the applicants upon their departure from the Center.

Final plans are now being discussed with officials in Washington for the approval of the distribution of stamps to the residents.

OPA REVISES SHOE RATION; EXEMPTION LIST INCREASED

Washington, Feb. 22.--(INS)--The Office of Price Administration Monday exempted from the rationed list current stocks of "play" shoes and revised its definition of "infants' shoes" to place in the non-rationed classification all baby shoes up to size 4, according to the Commercial Appeal.

Specifically excluded from rationing are current stocks of ski shoes, skate shoes, rubber soled shoes with fabric uppers, looker sandals, bathing slippers and a variety of other play shoes made of fabric or types of leather not on the critical list.

Originally, only soft soled infants' shoes were "ration free." Now, all baby shoes up to size 4, whether made with hard or soft soles, will be unrationed.

The OPA order goes into effect next Thursday.

Also in the exempt class are all imported Mexican huaraches and all footwear that does not have a rubber or leather sole and in which leather is used only as hinges, tabs, heel inserts or other nonskid or soundproof features.

OPA said shoes excluded from rationing very likely will be on sale in retail stores during the summer.

MEDICAL PERSONNEL

Feb. 18, 1943

Qualified doctors and dentists may answer question 27 on Form 304A as follows: "Yes, if I am commissioned." Every effort will be made to obtain commissions for them although the medical personnel of the combat team will be limited because of its size and for that reason not all of them may be taken initially. Doctors and dentists should also execute Form OPB 2 which is being mailed to you.

ALIEN VOLUNTEERS

Feb. 21, 1943

Any alien desiring to volunteer should execute Form 304A. Effort will be made to permit their enlistment, but make no promise in that respect since it will require an enlargement of the present program.

SPECIAL COMBAT TEAM

Feb. 18, 1943

The question that has arisen most frequently is, "Why is a separate unit being formed and will the combat team fight in the same battle areas with Caucasian troops?"

The Secretary of War has directed that the following reply be brought to the attention of all Japanese-Americans within your Center, "It is only because the War department desires

to aid the loyal Japanese-Americans that a separate unit is being formed. Millions of people are not familiar with the Japanese-Americans. By forming an all-Japanese-American combat team on a voluntary basis, the American people will be presented with the incontrovertible fact that there are loyal Japanese-Americans who are willing to fight for the United States. If the volunteers were spread throughout the army, their enlistment would attract little attention, but the formation of an all-Japanese-American combat team composed entirely of volunteers will help tremendously to convince

LOCAL RED CROSS COMMITTEE TO ELECT PROJECT CHAIRMAN

Rohwer Red Cross committee and all interested residents will meet tomorrow at 7:30 p.m. in PS hall 15, instead of PS hall 20, to elect the chairmen for the various Red Cross project committees.

The Red Cross projects were pointed out as vital to the Centerites' welfare by Mrs. Audrey Bassett, regional director of Red Cross, during her conference with the Rohwer unit officers last week. They include: home service, disaster preparedness and relief; home nursing; and first aid and accident prevention.

The home service committee will be in charge of International Red Cross work which includes sending messages to Japan and making arrangements for servicemen to visit relatives here in cases of emergency.

NOTED NISEI SCULPTOR TELLS OF RELOCATION

"I had been at Poston until a short time before the disturbance and I am afraid I must report that the newspaper interpretation of it—that the rioters were merely pro-Axis elements—was oversimplified," states Isamu Noguchi, a well-known American sculptor, in the February 1 issue of the "New Republic."

Noguchi went to the Poston center voluntarily last April in order to help relocation by contributing his services as an artist in developing the areas. Under the WRA's new policy to relocate as many residents as possible, Noguchi was forced to return to New York.

"To date there is no provision for redistribution

of the evacuees from the centers except as individuals. Placement of them, sight unseen and with general suspicion rampant, is difficult enough, but added to this is the reluctance on the part of the Japanese to go out alone into a part of the country they have never seen, where they fear discrimination; and where they will be cut off from the social contacts upon which they depend," continued Noguchi.

"This is especially true of the parents, whose individual adjustment to a strange community would be extremely difficult. As they constitute the skilled farmers who formerly grew an annual crop worth more than \$100,000,000,

in California, group resettlement of them, limited perhaps to twenty-five families each, would not only facilitate their exit but return them to a productivity which is badly needed. To a planned program for selected areas they could bring their own resources on a cooperative basis."

Noguchi expressed hope that the WRA would attempt to deal with the evacuees as a whole, in problems of self-government, rather than dealing merely with the second-generation group.

EDITORIAL COOPERATION

Some people have failed to understand the duties and relationships between the block manager and the steward within their respective blocks.

The block manager is an administrative employee (elected by the people in the block) performing administrative duties assigned to him by the Project director. Among the duties which he performs are: Distributes information such as rules, regulations and instructions issued by the Project director to the residents in his block; collects and distributes mail; assists in housing problems including changes in residence, repairs, etc.; distributes supplies such as soap, brooms and mops to the residents; assists residents in emergency cases such as serious illness. Until a permanent council is established, he must take the initiative in any problem if the issue affects his block or the interest of Center residents.

Although the steward is assigned by another department of the administration, and his duties remain strictly in the interest of his mess hall, there must be cooperation and understanding between the block manager and the steward. Consequently, in my conviction, without this most vital understanding no block can maintain peace and harmony.

Each should realize that he has a job to do and his aim should be to do it well. That is the greatest contribution he can make to a successful community.
