Visited the Moody Memorial Church in the afternoon and heard grand missionary program. One of the speakers was a worker from Minidoka. Saw Doris Sato at the Armitage Methodist Church where the Rev. Samuel Takagishi is nisei leader. Nisei are generally living in crowded quarters and although busy they are rather lonely. They confide that they lack the warm homogeneous fellowship atmosphere that they experienced back hane. city is so impersonal that each one seem to go about their own business. The churches have a tromondous part to play, espocially during the early days when the evacuees come out of the camps.
