## *Voice from the north*

"After meeting the Rohwer people that I mentioned last week, Rev. Oyama and I walked down Clark St. and met Sam Kakita at his restaurant. It's surprizing how you "bump into" folks from the Arkansas camp. Among the busy shopping crowd were Mary Nakahara and Atsuko and Rinko Shimazaki. Many nisei soldiers, some back from overseas, are seen here. Believe it or not, men are still wearing topcoats. I bought a new hat but the wind would have carried it to Lake Michigan had I not grabbed it!

It was a treat to hear Dr. Ernest F. Tittle at the University of Chicago chapel last Sunday. The majestic cathedral atmosphere amidst the surrounding of green lawn and beautiful overhanging trees makes it an ideal place to worship. Visited the Moody Memorial Church in the afternoon and heard grand missionary program. One of the speakers was a worker from Minidoka. Saw Doris Sato at the Armitage Methodist Church where the Rev. Samuel Takagishi is nisei leader. Nisei are generally living in crowded quarters and although busy they are rather lonely. They confide that they lack the warm homogeneous fellowship atmosphere that they experienced back home. The big city is so impersonal that each one seem to go about their own business. The churches have a tremendous part to play, especially during the early days when the evacuees came out of the camps.

My friends, when you relocate, be sure to hunt up a church in your community and go. By attending the meeting of the Chicago Church Federation this morning (Monday), I appreciated anew, the effort that the local churchmen and pastors are exerting to help and integrate the resettlers to this area. They are certainly doing their very level best in our behalf. Will we respond? It's up to us.

I trust that each one of you are strengthening your devotional life. Read the Bible, systematically and regularly. Close it and think about the passage read. Pray daily."
