# REGISTRATION STARTS MONDAY

For the coming registration, there are several questions in the forms that require preparation. To avoid delay during the registration, residents are asked to have the following information: local selective service board; mother's name and birthplace; employers' name, business, address and dates employed from 1935 to date; and list of five references; preferably Caucasian, with name, occupation and address.

Registration will be conducted in Mess halls 31 and 35 starting from Monday. A schedule of hours will be furnished all block managers prior to Monday morning.

# JOHNSTON DECLARES SIGN-UP COMPULSORY

In the following message to the Center, Project director Ray D. Johnston announced the compulsory registration of all residents 17 years or over, except those who have done so voluntarily and those who have applied for repatriation. The questionnaire includes only the forms on information for leave clearance and does not include voluntary enlistment to the army.

"Registration on a voluntary basis in this Center, has been a failure. The registration of all people 17 years and older, except those who had applied for repatriation, was ordered for all relocation centers on February 1, on a compulsory basis. We wanted the people in this Center to have a chance to register on a voluntary rather than compulsory basis, and felt that good cooperation would be secured. Now that the voluntary plan has failed, we have been notified by the Washington WRA office to carry out the original instructions as fast as possible.

"While registration is compulsory, it DOES NOT mean that anyone has to volunteer for armed service, (Continued on page 2)

## JUARDIANS 10 FILE REPORT

In a recent memorandum from Russel T. Robinson, chief of evacuee property, all residents who have been made guardiens of minors by courts either in California, Arizona or Oregon were advised to file their guardian's reports as soon as possible.

Although the deadline for the report was Jan. 31, no heavy penalty will be imposed if they are filed within a reasonable length of time.

All guardians who have not filed the reports may receive assistance at the Project attorney's office.

# EQUALITY

"All men are created equal" are words which may not be wholly true, but it is possible through artificial man-made means to bring about a semblance of equality. Politically, it has manifosted itself in these United States; socially, it exists in Sweden; and economically, the Soviet Union has been trying these past decades to carve a Utopia for her populace.

This equality for which many have fought (even as in this war), though few have succeeded in getting, is a

thing that we in this Center possess.

Evacuation has brought that equality by tedring down the economic, social and political barriers. It has brought the farmer in contact with the businessman; it has brought the liberal minds together with the narrow-minded ones; and it has placed us all on the same economic level.

And when such is the situation that faces us, those few still retaining their selfish airs and the jaded distinction of having once been prominent, should forget self-created individualism and try to promote a more fraternal spirit in this Center.

Concisely, there are no big shots here. Our leaders are men who are sacrificing what time and energy they

have for the benefit of the people.

Thus, despite the hardships and the ironic implications of the mass movement, the realization of the need for cooperation and the understanding of real social values through the close contact of a hotorogeneous group will carry lasting future benefits.
