GOOD FARMING DROSDECTS IN DAKOTA

Albert Kawasaki and Shigetaka Kobayashi, who left on Feb. 4 with Arthur Eskelson, Utah-Idaho Sugar Beet Co. representative, returned Friday afternoon from their inspection tour of the South Dakota beetfields, including a 4000mile trip through Nebraska, South Dakota, Wyoming and Colorado.

Kobayashi said that the majority of Japanese farmers he encountered in Dakota had prospered sufficiently to send their children through college.

"South Dakota has been settled in three immigrational waves, " he said. "The Danes, the Finns and lastly the Germans and Russians. All have at one time or another encountered community resistance and prejudice. At present the German and Russian groups are the strongest economically, due to their industriousness. Since they exert a strong moral and economic influence community sympathy is with the

hard-working.

"The Japanese are well received in Dakota. Politicians as well as farmers have oome to realize the benefits to be derived from the use of Japanese farmers and labor."

According to Kobayashi, at present there are nearly 10,000 acres open to Japanese. At first about 300 to 500 straight labor men will be required. Thirty to forty share oroppers are wanted now, but more will

Sugar beets are the secondary business in the state; dairy work is first. Farmers average 12 tons of sugar beets per acre with a 16 per cent sugar content. A maximum of 20 tons per acre is possible with a better use of fertilizer. At present Japanese farmers are getting from 15 to 16 tons an acre.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 21 Japanese - Americans who have been evacuated cannot be deprived of their right to vote, the seven Judges of the Federal Appellate Court ruled yesterday, without leaving the bench.

U.S. Webb, former State Attorney General, argued in behalf of the Native Sons that the names of some 70,000 Japanese-Americans born in this country should be stricken from the registration rolls.

When Walter Dold, assistant dty attorney, arose to defend Cameron King, the Registrar of Voters, Presiding Judge Curtis Wilbur

said:

"It is not necessary for this court to hear further argument. The decision of the lower court is sustained."

The court took under submission cases involving the constitutionality of the evacuation of the American-born Japanese by order of General John L. DeWitt, who acted under President Roosevelt's executive order 9066.

On the guestion of whether Japanese-Americans should be deprived of their right to vote, Webb inforentially asked the court to rule contrary to the decisions

of the Supreme Court in the Wong Kin Ark case of 1898. That decision, upholding the citizenship of a Chinese born in this country, has been taken to apply to Japanese born here.

Webb told the court that, without committing treason," he had come the conclusion that the case was "erroneously oi ded . "

"Are you asking this court to overrule a decision of the Supreme Court?" asked Judge Wilbur.

"I'm asking the court, as God gives it light and power, to give a correct (Continued on page 5)

able for drinking. Latest report from the State Board of Health on the analyses of the unboiled and boiled water samples taken from the Center reveals that dangerous organisms exist in the unboiled water.

Boiled water proved bacteria-free and immune from any form of contamination, thus making it safe for

human consumption.

All messes have adequate boiled drinking water available for everyone in his respective block, so residents were advised by L. A. May, Project steward, to imbibe aqua only when it is boiled.


When Webb said that the country had been settled and the government organized by whites, Judge William Donman asked him:

EDITORIAL HE RED CROSS

Setting a national goal of \$125,000,000, on March. 1 the American Red Cross embarked upon the greatest came paign in its history. According to the Red Cross News Service, millions of volunteers will be recruited to assist in the nation-wide appeal, which will be conducted under the direction of Walter S. Gifford, president of the American Telephone and Telegraph company. and national chairman of the 1943 Red Cross combination Roll Call and War fund.

The announced goal represents the minimum requirement's of the organization in order to assume its wartime obligations. This sum will cover local, national and international war-time needs of the Red Cross, bar-

ring unforeseen emergencies or disasters.

Sometime next week, after the reorganization of the local chapter, a campaign will be conducted in the Center to recruit the aid of Center residents. Half of the collected sums will be made available for the use of the local organization while the remainder will be utilized by the national headquarters for its worldwide work.

Significantly, the Red Cross has been carrying on its work even from the early part of relocation by setting up First Aid classes for instruction, by initiating a Junior Red Cross chapter and by aiding contact of evacuees with stranded relatives in the Far East.

The support of the people in this coming drive cannot be as financially heavy as in previous years, but every contribution that is made toward this internationally-minded Red Cross will bear its fruits in making possible greater racial understanding in the coming years.
