1. Value of project to school and to members of group carrying it out.

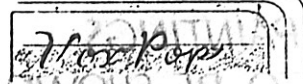

 Cuz they're the ones that made me die.

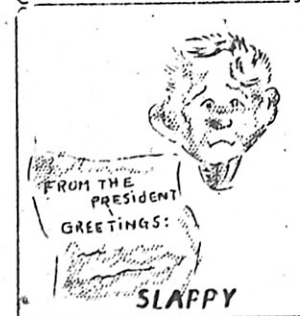


Akimoto now Mr. Akimoto

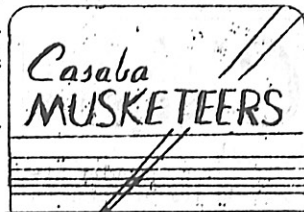
