

BOUNDARY CHANGED; 215 IN AREA FREED

The Western Defense Command announced Thursday a change in the boundary line of the restricted area in Arizona. This line has been shifted south and west to the extent that Poston and Gila River relocation centers are out of the restricted area. In the future all evacuees visiting these two centers may travel without escorts.

Two hundred fifteen persons evacuated from the area now removed from the evacuated zone will be allowed to return to their homes immediately. This shift decided upon by the Secretary of War fits in with recent developments of leave policy and army enlistment and is another step toward re-establishing normal life to persons of Japanese ancestry evacuated from the west coast.

COL. SCOBEE ADDRESSES MANAGERS' DELEGATION

"Volunteering constitutes the symbol of loyalty and sincerity. Nothing establishes loyalty more plainly than fighting." Thus Colonel W. P. Scobee, executive officer for the Assistant Secretary of War John J. McCloy, expressed his views before a delegate of block managers Tuesday night.

On the tour of the WRA projects, the purpose of Scobee's visit here was to find out why this Center was not making better progress on the army plan, because other centers had better enlistment.

STORED GOODS SHIPMENT SOON

Privately stored effects will be en route to the Center soon, as letters are being sent to expedite the shipments from central receiving warehouses, according to C. V. Updegraff, Transportation and Supply.

The delay in effecting the transfer of the storage earlier was caused by the slowness of conveying the materials in private storage to the receiving points.

FORMATION OF WRA OFFICE INSTITUTED

A branch of the Evacuee Property office will be established at the Rohwer relocation center according to an announcement received today by Project director Ray D. Johnston from Russell T. Robinson, chief of the WRA Evacuee Property office in San Francisco. A representative will soon come here to be a member of the Project staff. Through his assistance will be provided in handling problems of management, operation and disposition of real and personal property or in settling claims held by evacuees. In this work the Evacuee Property office representative will have the cooperation of the Project attorney.

YOUTHS MUST SIGN UP WITH REGISTRAR

Center youths are not appearing for selective service registration upon reaching their 18th birthday, Registrar J. A. Trice complained today. Only 5 appeared in February at 31-1-A.

Under the terms of the Selective Service act all men must appear for registration upon reaching their eighteenth birthday.

The decision to have an Evacuee Property office representative stationed here came as a result of the uncertainty in handling outside property matters. The OUTPOST will print several articles, setting forth the services which the Evacuee Property office is able to render and what information residents will be required to furnish in order to avail themselves of this service, which will be free to them.

It is to be distinctly understood, Robinson stated, that the Evacuee Property office does not direct what disposition should be made of any property or how it should be managed. Officials, however, will act as advisers when called upon to do so.

The Evacuee Property office is not intended to take the place of any other property agency such as banks, attorneys, real estate agents, etc., but rather to provide an auxiliary service.

TAX COLLECTORS TO REPORT WED.

Deputy collectors from the State Internal Revenue office, Herrin I. Peacock and J. Hearn Latimer, will report Wednesday, 8 a.m., at the Project attorney's office to assist the residents in filing their Federal income tax returns.

They will remain for two days.

TRIBUNE VIEWS THE JAPANESE

"In this country we have 107,500 Japanese locked up in internment camps to which they were removed from their homes in the Pacific coastal area. Two thirds of them are Ameri-can citizens," stated a recent editorial from the Chicago Daily Tribune tit-led; "Japanese in America and Hawaii."

"Meanwhile, we have in Hawaii 160,000 Japanese, of whom 36,000 are aliens. Lt. Gen. Emmons, the mili-tary governor of the ter-ritory, says their presence is a definite menace, but

they are not locked up. Whether this is because their labor is valuable in the sugar and pineapple plantations and elsewhere, or for other reasons, is not made clear," continued the editorial.

"Thus, we have a hundred odd thousand Japanese in-terpersed with close to 10,000,000 white Americans in the Pacific coast states and we have hustled them off and locked them up for fear they will do us harm. We have 170,000 Japanese, constituting a third of the population of the is-

lands that are the key-stone of our Pacific de-fense, and we leave them at liberty. Without com-mitting oneself on whether any one should be locked up, it seems fairly appar-ant that the locking up, if it was necessary any-where, started in the wrong place. The procedure is not without a smell of lynch law or vigilantism."

"Two thirds of the in-terned Japanese are Ameri-can citizens. That, also, is something new under our constitutional system. On

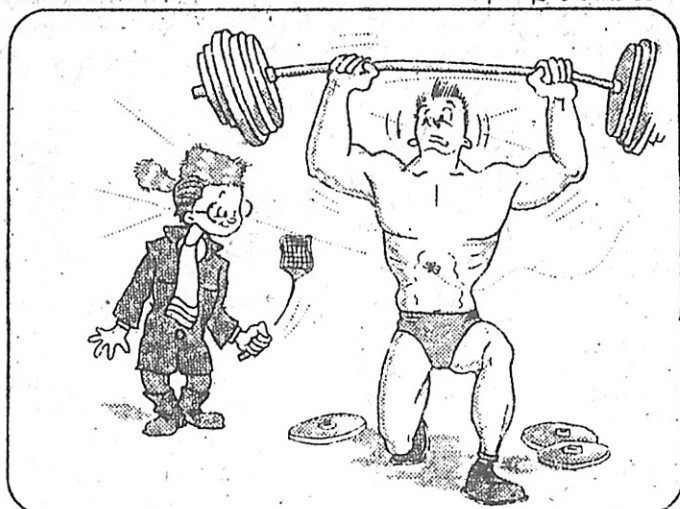
