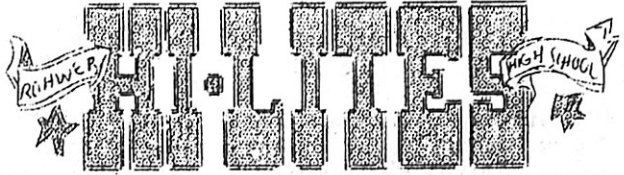


FRIENDSHIP HOUR OBSERVED

ADE VISITS R.H.S.

Dr. Lester K. Ade, WRA Director of Education, made a brief visit to the Center Schools this week. He plans to visit five of the Centers on this particular trip. In addition to the Center, he will spend some time on the West Coast, especially in Oregon and Washington, where he plans conferences with the state departments of Education in order to facilitate the transfer of students from Center schools to schools in those states.

In response to a question on credits Dr. Ade said our schools are fully accredited by the states where they're located through close cooperation with the state departments in those states. He stressed the excellent cooperation he had received from the Arkansas Department of Education.

When asked whether he had observed any changes since his last trip Dr. Ade mentioned how impressed he was with our auditorium and with its murals. He had also had his first opportunity to see our Home Ec Building since its completion.

Dr. Ade feels that for those who fear that government support of schools means government control, the WRA Center Schools should serve as reassurance, for they have experienced a minimum of government control while being completely financed by the federal government.

Smudge Uyeno, winter '45 graduate has now become the Editor on the Out-Post. She was also the editor of the Hi-Lites.

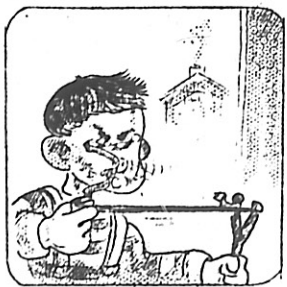
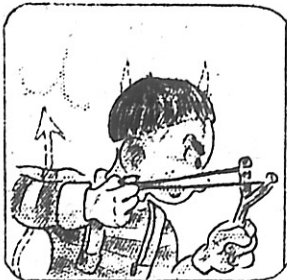
