REGISTRATION FOR 18 YEAR OLDS

All boys reaching the age of 18 during the month of April are requested to register immediately for Selective Service at 31-1-A.

The State board has reprimanded the local board because of the delay upon the part of Center youths to register.

Stern measures will be adopted by the local board for failure to comply. Those failing to register will be violating the federal law and will be subject to severe punishment.

Negligence to register at the specified time will also be taken into consideration when applying for leave clearance.

Those attaining the age of 18 during May are also requested to register soon.

H.R. 2011 GETS GROUP BACKING

NEW YORK, April 14 -- Representatives of various Asiatic groups hitherto ineligible to become naturalized citizens of the United States decided at their meeting last week upon a six-point program to publicize and campaign for the passage of the Marcantonio bill.

The Bill, officially known as H.R. 2011, which would amend the present Naturalization law so that Persons of Oriental nationality can become citizens of the United States, was introduced in Congress by Vito Marcantonio, representative from New York, and is now in the Immigration and Naturalization Com-

mittee of the House.

On the East coast, representatives of Chinese, Japanese, Indian and Caucasian American groups have been meeting since the introduction of this bill. The American Committee for the Protection of the Foreign Born is acting as the coordinating organization for the campaign.

The six-point program to be initiated immediately is as follows:

1. A petition will be circulated to obtain at least one million signatures of people favoring the bill.
2. Endorsement of the bill will be obtained from prominent Americans.

3. A mass meeting in which all Asiatic groups in America will be represented will be called in New York followed by like meetings in other sections of the country to educate all Americans to the importance of this bill and to enlist their active participation in the campaign.

4. Pamphlets will be published to bring about a thorough understanding and to arouse interest in the problem of the whole relationship of the Asiatic people to the rest of the American people.

5. A national broadcast is planned with Congressman Marcantonio as speaker.

"Out in the mid-Pacific on the island of Oahu, Hawaii, boxing in the Army is doing an SRO business at all times. And in the Hawaiian group, the biggest boxing program is being dished up at famous Schofield Barracks, one time home of the Hawaiian division and current home for thousands of young, hard-hitting, well conditioned American soldiers.

"Schofield Barracks not only has the largest permanent fight arena in the Army, but it also has a set-up that allows perfect match-making along All-American lines. Soldiers at Schofield represent every known race and color and all share and share alike in the ring, in the stands and at all athletic events. The winner is cheered; the loser gets his share of cheers for having made it a great fight.

"There is no racial prejudice and out of nine champs crowned in January, two were colored boys and two were Americans of Japanese descent while another was a Filipino."

The two nisei champions were Joe Matsunaga, who claimed the flyweight title, and middleweight king, Richard Kato, who is believed to be the heaviest nisei puncher in the ring.
