

ARRIVAL: FIRST PERSONAL PROPERTY LOAD

First carload of evacuee personal property from Los Angeles has been delivered to apartments, according to C. V. Updegraff, head of Transportation and Supply.

The second load left Los Angeles on April 13 and is expected to arrive at the end of this week with other shipments to follow.

Ration Books

"Persons who do not have War Ration Book 1 or who have not filed applications for shoe certificates should do so immediately," stated Assistant Project Director James F. Rains.

This applies especially to those who are planning on relocation, since it requires 2 to 3 weeks to get the books.

SOLDIERS MAY VISIT COAST

American soldiers of Japanese ancestry may visit evacuated areas on the west coast when on furlough or leave, according to the New York Times.

This announcement was made by Lieut. Gen. John L. DeWitt, commanding general of the Western Defense Command.

CONDITIONS ANALYZED IN SURVEY OF CHICAGO AREA

"Over three-fourths of the evacuees coming to Chicago in March arrived without jobs in advance," according to the Advisory Committee for Evacuees with headquarters in Chicago, Ill.

A cross-section survey of 270 relocated nisei in that area shows that it took on the average 10 to 15 days to secure employment.

"Finding a job is not a real problem. Finding the job to fit the person, however, can be. In every case to date, patience as well as determination to find a job, has resulted in satisfactory placement of nisei.

"It takes almost twice as long to find adequate housing as it does to get a job. There is wartime housing shortage in Chicago. The city is rated 99.7% full.

"Recreational and religious opportunities are unlimited in the Chicago area.

"Evacuees say that there is less race discrimination generally, despite the war, than they found on the far west coast. Some does exist, to be realistic, but few evacuees have encountered unpleasant incidents.

"The initial reaction of those going out was almost without exception, 'Freedom, it's wonderful.' The novelty wears off and the daily grind begins, but despite the longing for familiar faces, the new friends and experiences make them 'glad to be out.'"

EDITORIAL

TO OUR DEVELOPMENT

Swamps, river bottom land, virgin Hardwood forests, Akansa Indians (the tribe that inhabited this section of the South), settlers from the Atlantic seaboard, corn and cotton farms -- such would be a modified history of Rohwer and the surrounding territory until less than a year ago.

A new epoch started about ten months ago together with the uprooting from the West coast of the people connected by blood lines to the Japanese. It was then that the WRA commenced the erection of the centers here in Rohwer and in Jerome.

The now consummated migration, perhaps adds another historical note to a state already etched more richly and deeply with American traditions. But Arkansas has been impeded from gaining the full progress economically by certain limiting forces.

On the other hand, since the immigration of the first Japanese to the United States, barely sixty years have passed, and twenty years have gone by since the Exclusion act closed the doors of America to all Orientals. From the background of facing early discrimination, we have followed the drudgery and long hours on Hawaiian sugar plantations and California farms, the gradual growth of little farms, the development of diversified truck gardens, the fruition of moderate size businesses and the spreading of the group into all lines of our national economy.

Then came the leveling scythes of evacuation. Yet we are richer today in Americanism for we still have not lost the spirit of initiative that our fathers have brought to this country, the same initiative that was brought by other immigrant groups.

Rohwer and Jerome have brought the merging of tradition-filled America with the now.

We--Arkansas with its past discrimination that has prevented it from attaining the economic development that is rightfully hers and the Japanese Americans who have suffered discrimination along racial lines--look forward to the future when we may gain a higher niche in the American nation.
