EMERGENCY GRANTS

Relocated Persons May Get Assistance From Local Boards

All persons on leave who are unable to pay for essential medical care or who need other emergency assistance while away from the Center, should go to the nearest local welfare bureau immediately, stated Project leave officer Herschel Abbott today.

The War Relocation Authority will not be responsible for medical or other assistance to evacuees outside of relocation centers.

To assist evacuees on leave and other groups who were forced to leave their homes as a wartime measure, special funds have been set aside to help in case of difficulties while trying to re-establish themselves.

Evacuees will be aided by the local welfare boards under an arrangement worked out between the Social Security board and the WRA.

It is not necessary for an evacuee to establish the usual legal residence in a community in order to receive public welfare assistance.

EXAMINATIONS FOR FEDERAL CIVIL SERVICE TO BE GIVEN

With the arrival of J. N. Suggs, U. S. Civil Service examiner, meetings and examinations will be held today and not tomorrow and Friday, as announced in Saturday's OUTPOST.

6:30 p.m. - Examinations for the positions of typist and stenographer will be held in ad building 2.

REPATRIATION GROUP MAY CHANGE ANSWERS

Questions concerning what an evacuee should do when he has changed his mind on repatriation or expatriation are answered in the new WRA instructions, according to Project Director Ray D. Johnston.

Persons who have asked to be repatriated, or who have indicated acceptance or declination of repatriation as a result of lists of names submitted by the Japanese government may change their request by filing the proper form. Copies may be obtained at the office of Jack Curtis, Project attorney in ad building 2.

The War Relocation Authority cannot guarantee the exchange of evacuees applying for repatriation; however, it can place the applications with the State department for consideration in the exchange negotiation.

"While each evacuee is free to decide for himself whether he wants to apply for exchange to Japan, the decision should not be arrived at hastily or lightly. The individual's choice in this matter may have far reaching consequences. It should be made only after careful thought," said Johnston.

KEEP OUT OF TARGET AREA

A shooting range is being set up for the Military Police four miles west of the Center.

The selected area lies west of the sewage disposal works and north of the ditch which formerly carried the treated sewage away from the plant.

The target practice is a routine training requirement and will last about 30 days beginning tomorrow.

Captain Russell P. Hastings, commanding officer of the Military Police, has asked that the residents avoid the area although guards will be provided when men are on the range.

MEDICAL CORPS CALL DOCTOR

Dr. Norman Kobayashi, who was called by the US Medical Reserve Corps to active duty as First Lieutenant, left this morning for the Medical Field Service school, Carlisle Barracks, Pa., for a seven-week advance training. Then he will report to the command of the Americans of Japanese Ancestry unit at Camp Shelby, Miss.

Receiving his M.D. degree from the University of California in 1933, Dr. Kobayashi was in medical practice for nine years in Los Angeles with Dr. K. Tashiro. When he received his M.D. degree he was also commissioned 1st Lt. in the MRC.

Dr. Kobayashi was born in San Francisco; later moved to Salinas; and graduated from Fresno high school. His wife, three children and mother are residing in Block 38.

NYA OPENS VOCATIONAL TRAINING TO WRA YOUTH

Emphasizing that employment opportunities for the Japanese-Americans in war industries are good, Joseph Stamler, WRA vocational training director, spoke to a large gathering last night in Mess hall 31.

He stated that young men and women between the ages of 17-25, who are US citizens are eligible to apply for training outside at NYA centers in preparation for war production jobs. He is interested in assisting placement of both men and women in NYA residence centers.

While training, each person will receive \$15.90 per month plus room and board. Emergency medical care and laundry facilities will also be available. The training period will cover from 6 weeks to 3 months.

J. A. Trice, who has visited a number of NYA centers, said that the dormitories, mess hall facilities, recreational areas, work shops are well-equipped and well-situated. Courses in which instructions will be given include machine shop, welding, sheet metal, craft woodwork, auto mechanics, radio, photography and stenography. "This unique opportunity opens up the wide-scaled facilities of the NYA for the WRA youth and will aid both men and women in resettlement since the nation needs skilled workers very badly," said Stamler.

EDITORIAL

A TRUE PERSPECTIVE

"Japanese Americans are not, and were not dangerous to national safety," said John W. Powell, assistant Chief of Community Services at the Colorado River WRA center, at a meeting of the national conference of social workers recently, according to the UP release in the Pacific Citizen.

Denouncing controlled migration of California nisei, Powell stated that their major crime was "to have created hundreds of millions of dollars in agricultural wealth which some of their neighbors sought to control by forcing the racial issue under the forced draught of war fears."

The desert barracks were described as being planned for young soldiers on field duty and not a place in which to carry on family life.

He added that camp confinement is destructive to initiative and will develop the "WPA attitude" toward labor.

Homer Morris, Philadelphia, head of resettlement work for the American Fields Service committee, stated that they must keep in mind that two-thirds of the people in these centers are American citizens, who have been charged of no crime and are guilty of no offense against the peace and security of the United States.

In these times of stress, it is fortunate that the officials of the WRA are of such character that they do not allow narrow-minded prejudices to control the thoughts within their minds.

To John Powell, Homer Morris and others like them should go the distinction of being a true American in the real sense of the word.

BLOCK MANAGERS

On Saturday, the second term of the block managers officially began without much pomp or ceremony. Many of the former managers have given up their positions to others this term in order to do work which they feel is more in their line.

These men, the old and new officers alike, have faced and will face many problems concerning the welfare of their blocks. Many residents of the Center do not realize that behind most of the over-all changes that have taken place in recent months have been not only the cooperative attitude of the administration but the persistent pressure constantly exerted by the block managers' group.

In due respect to these men who look after the well-being of the individual blocks so that Rohwer as a whole may gain, we would like to thank them for their past efforts and wish them success in realizing their aims in the future.

May 5, 1943

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We journeyed down to nearby Jerome last Friday to see the local prep quintet suffer its second straight defeat. Although playing a better brand of ball than in the previous encounter, the Denson's superior height advantage and all-around team co-ordination was a little too much for the local boys.

The loss of Min Ogasawara, Dick Shimasaki and Sumio Nakamoto, through mid-term graduation, was keenly felt by the team. The above trio were the best on the local prep court and no doubt would have changed the complex of the Jerome series, if they had been able to play.

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Had the pleasure of running into Shig Tokumoto, Jerome's baseball commissioner; Herb Kurima, Florin speed-merchant; and veteran Ed Tsukimura, widely known Central California baseball leader and manager of the Bowles nine.

Tokumoto is remembered as the crafty subway slinger for the powerful Hanford Templars and Ken Zonimura's Central California All-Stars, while to all Northerners, Kurima is one of the better nisei hurlers.

We were able to gather some pertinent dope on the baseball situation of the neighboring Center and from their outlook the coming season in Jerome is headed for a rip-roaring campaign with an attendance of 2000 to 4000 expected at each game. The five-team "A" loop will tee off this Sunday and heading the flag chase are Florin, Fresno assembly champion; and Hanford, perennial Central California kingpin.

We took a gander out to their ball orchard, and the ground certainly looks promising although not completely finished to date. However, the backstop is posted and screened up and is fenced down the right and left field line. When

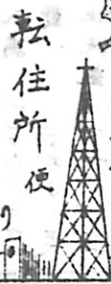
