The War Relocation Authority will not be responsible for medical or other assistance to evacuees outside of relocation centers.

To assist evacuees on leave and other groups who were forced to loave their homes as a wartime measure, special funds have been set aside to help in case of difficulties while trying to re-establish themselves.

Evacuees will be aided by the local welfare boards under an arrangement worked out between the Social Security board and the WRA.

It is not necessary for an evacuoe to establish the usual legal residence in a community in order to receive public welfare assist-

REPATRIATION GROUP MAY CHANGE ANSWERS

Questions concerning what an evacuee should do when he has changed his mind on repatriation or expatriation are answered in the new WRA instructions, according to Project Director Ray D. Johnston.

The War Relocation Authority cannot guarantee the exchange of evacuees applying for repatriation; however, it can place the applications with the State department for consideration in the exchange nego-

tiation. "While each evacuee is free to decide for himself whother he wants to apply for exchange to Japan, the decision should not be arrived at hastily or lightly. The individual's choice in this matter may have far reaching consequences. It should be made only after careful thought," said Johnston.

"Japanese Americans are not, and were not dangerous to national safety," said John W. Powell, assistant Chief of Community Services at the Colorado River WRA center, at a meeting of the national conference of social workers recently, according to the UP release in the Pacific Citizen.

Denouncing controlled migration of California nisei, Powell stated that their major crime was "to have created hundreds of millions of dollars in agricultural wealth which some of their neighbors sought to control by forcing the racial issue under the forced draught of war fears."

The desert barracks were described as being planned for young soldiers on field duty and not a place in which to carry on family life.

He added that camp confinement is destructive to initiative and will develop the "WPA attitude" toward labor.

Homer Morris, Philadelphia, head of resettlement work for the American Fields Service committee, stated that they must keep in mind that two-thirds of the people in these centers are American citizens, who have been charged of no crime and are guilty of no offense against the peace and security of the United States.

In these times of stress, it is fortunate that the officials of the WRA are of such character that they do not allow narrow-minded prejudices to control the thoughts within their minds.

To John Powell, Homer Morris and others like them should go the distinction of being a true American in the real sense of the word.
