

INSTRUCTION ALLOWS ISSEI BETTER TERMS

"According to a recent amendment to Administrative Instruction No. 34, issei may now hold elective offices in the evacuee Community government," stated Ray D. Johnston, Project Director, today.

"I am pleased that this change has been made; it responds to the desires of the evacuees generally, meets the situation resulting from many of the nisei going out of the Center on leave and will permit both issei and nisei to be represented on the Community council," said Johnston.

The constitution which was prepared under the terms of the original instruction by the organization commission, headed by James Nakamura, is now being revised. The corrected copies of the constitution will be distributed to the residents next week, and an election will be called to vote upon its ratification.

WCCA FUNDS, TOPIC OF BLOCK MANAGERS' MEET

Clothing allowance from assembly centers, missing fire extinguishers, sprays for plants and fast driving were some of the important matters discussed at the block managers' meeting early this week.

Chairman Jerry Uchiyama read a letter from Philip M. Glick, solicitor, which stated that the WCCA has been abolished and there are no longer any funds from which the assembly center clothing allowances can be paid.

INTERNEES' STATUS

Soldier-Internee Case May Be Granted A New Hearing

Wilma van Dusseldorp, chief counselor of the social welfare department, is compiling a list of Rohwer families in which a son is in the US armed forces and a parent in an internment camp. This move is in accordance with the US Department of Justice's indicated willingness to re-examine the files of such cases to determine whether a rehearing should be granted or status of "friendly alien" be conferred.

Therefore, all such families in this Center are asked to report immediately to the social welfare department in ad building 2 or to the north end of PS hall 42. Each family is asked to bring the name of the interned member, the place of internment, the alien identification number and place of residence before internment.

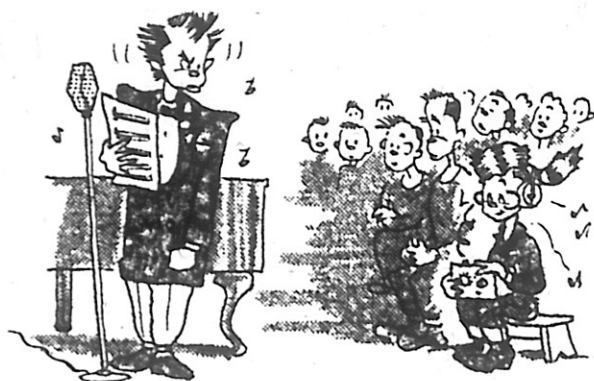

EDITORIAL

VOCATIONS VIA NYA

The opening of the NYA training facilities for the nisei in the relocation center affords a number of youths an opportunity to get proper training in various vocational fields.

The initial plan calls for a quota limit of 23 men and a similar number of women from each of the two centers in Arkansas. Qualifications require that the applicants must be between the ages of 16 and 25 and must be US citizens.

The NYA centers, located in this section of the nation are similar to those which are found elsewhere. They are well-kept, nicely situated, adequately equipped institutions that can train the individuals to attain a great degree of proficiency in not only mechanical and technical work but also in the commercial field.

The relocation center does not offer the average young man a chance to learn anything which may prove of great value in the post-war period so that the training program of the NYA appears to be the best alternative short of attending schools on the outside at great financial expense.

Many may hesitate to take this offer because an indefinite leave will have to be taken in order to get this 6 weeks to 4 months of training and because the NYA cannot guarantee employment upon the completion of the courses; however, the placement record of the NYA, working in conjunction with the United States Employment Service, has been good.

Furthermore, "The NYA has been informed that while the WRA would carry the major responsibility for placement of evacuees trained by NYA," the NYA itself has been asked to aid in finding jobs for their students. In the event that both agencies fail to locate positions for the students, the trainees will be able to come back to the center on the same basis as other people who have gone out on indefinite leaves.

Viewed from these angles, the NYA plan is a sound and a welcome one but the decision of applying rests on the individuals who are planning to go.
