strong poisonous nature of the powder, it should positively not be applied on leafy vegetables such as nappa, daikon, spinach, cabbage and other greens.

M. Takeuchi of the entomology division of the agricultural department suggests that the insecticide not be used on the tomatoes, cucumbers, eggplants and beans after the fruits have formed.

Aphis may be controlled by using home-made tobacco juice mixed with a solution of soapy water.

RELOCATION HIGHLIGHTS CARRIED IN "OREGONIAN"

In a recent issue of the Portland Oregonian is a story by Mel Arnold, who visited Chicago to check on the resettlement of Japanese from relocation centers.

Arnold relates experiences which show that town-people are changing their opposition to approval when they see that relocating residents are hard workers eager to make good.

An interesting point was that Elmer Shirrell left the directorship of Tule Lake relocation center to open the first regional office in Chicago. Other midwest offices to aid in resettlement are located in Cleveland and Kansas City with suboffices in principal midwestern cities.

To date, more than 2500 are working in the middle west and east. Another group of 300 have official releases and will leave the centers as soon as they find a job.

Aiding the problem of housing, church groups have come forth with hostels to which nisei may go until they find work.

FOURTH PERIOD RALLY NIPS LOCAL CAGERS IN THRILLER

Taking command of the situation after trailing all of the first half and most of the second, the Denson All-Stars came to life in the closing minutes of a tight cage duel to rush in with a 25-21 victory over the fast Rohwer All-Stars Sunday at the high school field.

Behind 21-18 with less than four minutes left, the tall Denson quintet burst forth with a swift scoring rally that netted them three goals and a gift shot to overtake the stunned Rohwer cagers, who were held scoreless during the outbreak.

It was Winky Odaka and Nori Masuda who ignited the fireworks when they slipped

in a tip-in and a free throw, respectively, to knot the game. Masuda came through. 20 seconds later again to cinch the affair with a underhand shot and lanky Jim Murashima followed in for keeps by ringing a soft lay-in.

The local players, handicapped by the visitors' tremendous height advantage, nevertheless more than made up for the difference with their speed and slippery deception which kept the post-season classic hot and furious.

Sparked by a pair of pint-sized speed burners in Jimmie Hayashi and Hiro "Scooter" Kayasuga, the Rohwer All-Stars displayed fast-breaking basketball and for a time had the taller opponents going around in circles.

Kayasuga-Hayashi and company went into a quick 7-4 first quarter lead, 15-14 command at midway mark and then stretched it to 19-16 at the beginning of the final period.

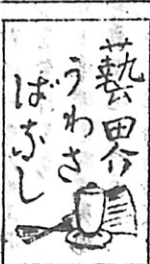
