COMPENSATION CENTER CONSTITUTION RULES GIVEN

Government employees injured in the line of duty may draw workmen's compensation upon complying with the following provisions:

(1) Notice of injury must be reported to head of division within 48 hours.

(2) Claim for compensation must be filed within 60 days after the injury.

Forms for meeting these provisions may be obtained at the Project Attorney's office in Ad building 2.

Revised Community Formula For Government Distributed

Revised copies of the Constitution will be distributed to the block residents today.

Through an amondment to Administrative Instruction this important revision will provide eligibility to both issei and nisei to hold elective offices in the community evacuee government.

Ratification of the Constitution will be determined by a special election called by Ray D. Johnston,

Project Director, on Thursday, May 20.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. and voting will be by secret ballot in the office of the block manager of each block. Every resident will

be allowed to vote only in his own block and must be 18 years of age or over in order to vote.

If the Constitution is ratified, nomination and election of councilmen under the new government will be held as soon as possible, Johnston said.

CRYSTAL CITY CONDITIONS GIVEN FAVORABLE COMMENT

Located about one hundred and twenty miles southwest of San Antonio is the internment camp at Crystal City, Texas, where the climate is considered mild except for the excessive heat during the summer months.

Individual family units are in duplex, triplex or quadruplex types of buildings. Each housing unit with gypsum board parti-tions and concrete floors is furnished with a kitchen, cold running water, an oil stove with oven and essential cooking utensils and dishes.

Schools through high school grades are hoped to open next fall with a staff internee teachers of much as possible. Also provisions for a library are being made.

The canteen is already operated by the internees, and the central power operated laundry has been established for the laundering of sheets; pillow cases and work clothes.

For recreation, motion pictures are shown twice weekly and outdoor sports will be provided.

Hospital and dental facilities are available either in the town of Crystal City or at the internment camp.

All money and ohecks must be deposited with the official financial officer while mail and parcels ontering or leaving the camp are subject to examination and consorship by authorities.

The number of post cards and lotters are limited per individual but at least two letters and post cards por week will be permitted.

arge scale farming

With the arrival of midspring, the largest productive undertaking of the Center -- the Rohwer farming project -- has begun to pay dividends. Radishes and mustard greens are already being harvested while next week, spinach will be ready for cutting. The fields in general truck vegetables cover an area of 150 acres.

Over 250 are now employed to prepare the grounds for planting and to harvest the crops. With the harvesting of green beans, sweet corn, watermelons, cantaloupes, tomatoes and onions more workers will be needed.

Besides this, new acreage in eggplants, green peppers and other vegetables will increase the crop area to about 400 acros. This will be further bolstered by 300 more acros in feed corn, hay and soy beans.

The conversion of land, not previously used for commercial vegetables, into truck garden patches demonstrates the richness of the Arkansas soil and paves the way for the people of Arkansas to develop largescale diversified agriculture.


