

# COMPENSATION CENTER CONSTITUTION RULES GIVEN

Government employees injured in the line of duty may draw workmen's compensation upon complying with the following provisions:

(1) Notice of injury must be reported to head of division within 48 hours.

(2) Claim for compensation must be filed within 60 days after the injury.

Forms for meeting these provisions may be obtained at the Project Attorney's office in Ad building 2.

## Revised Community Formula For Government Distributed

Revised copies of the Constitution will be distributed to the block residents today.

Through an amendment to Administrative Instruction No. 34, this important revision will provide eligibility to both issei and nisei to hold elective offices in the community evacuee government.

Ratification of the Constitution will be determined by a special election called by Ray D. Johnston, Project Director, on Thursday, May 20.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. and voting will be by secret ballot in the office of the block manager of each block. Every resident will be allowed to vote only in his own block and must be 18 years of age or over in order to vote.

If the Constitution is ratified, nomination and election of councilmen under the new government will be held as soon as possible, Johnston said.

## ARKANSAS RIVER OVERFLOWS; FLOOD DANGERS DOUBTFUL

Based upon present reports that are believed to be reliable, there is no real danger of flood in the Center although 500 blocks in Little Rock are underwater and the Arkansas river threatens inundation of the nearby towns.

Opinions of the people familiar with this locality indicate that all of the many tributaries of the Mississippi must be high before an overflow in this area is likely.

Since heavy rains in

the north have flooded only the White and Arkansas rivers, the Mississippi should be able to hold the waters within her levees.

In the event that the water crest due Tuesday goes over the bank, the levee constructed about a mile east of the Center will adequately take care of flood danger.

The flood of 1927 was primarily due to the low construction of the levees and the high waters in all the Mississippi tributaries.

All money and checks must be deposited with the official financial officer while mail and parcels entering or leaving the camp are subject to examination and censorship by authorities.

The number of post cards and letters are limited per individual but at least two letters and post cards per week will be permitted.

## EDITORIALS

## LARGE SCALE FARMING

With the arrival of midspring, the largest productive undertaking of the Center -- the Rohwer farming project -- has begun to pay dividends. Radishes and mustard greens are already being harvested while next week, spinach will be ready for cutting. The fields in general truck vegetables cover an area of 150 acres.

Over 250 are now employed to prepare the grounds for planting and to harvest the crops. With the harvesting of green beans, sweet corn, watermelons, cantaloupes, tomatoes and onions more workers will be needed.

Besides this, new acreage in eggplants, green peppers and other vegetables will increase the crop area to about 400 acres. This will be further bolstered by 300 more acres in feed corn, hay and soy beans.

The conversion of land, not previously used for commercial vegetables, into truck garden patches demonstrates the richness of the Arkansas soil and paves the way for the people of Arkansas to develop large-scale diversified agriculture.

Rohwer's agricultural enterprise has been supervised by Assistant Project Director James F. Rains, acting chief of farming and his able assistants, Ben Reeves, farm superintendent; Thomas Howell, assistant farm superintendent; Junsuko Kanegaye, field supervisor; Frank Nishikawa, assistant field supervisor and Tom Coleman, in charge of maintenance of farm trucks and tractors.

## MORE AGITATION ?

Agitation on the West coast reached ridiculous proportions according to news from the San Francisco Chronicle that California congressmen have appointed Representative Costello (D., Cal.) to head a committee to oppose permission of Japanese-American soldiers from returning to restricted areas on the Pacific coast.

This action followed Assistant Secretary of War, McCloy's statement that the War department feels that Japanese-American soldiers could not be called upon "to fight in combat against the enemy without at the same time extending to them the privileges that all other American soldiers have."

Costello believes that Lt. Gen. DeWitt would not be transferred from the West coast. His committee members include Representatives Englebright (R), Izac (D), Anderson (R) and Tolan (D) -- (of Tolan hearing fame).

Further anti-racial proposals may be expected from these politicians, who typify the carpet-baggers of the post-Civil war South.

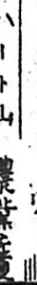
