OVERFLOW IMPROBABLE; TROOPS GUARD LEVEES

"There is no danger of flood," stated Assistant Project Director James F. Rains, when asked about flood danger to Rohwer.

Concerning Thursday night's rain, he stated that it was very local and did not even hit McGehee.

After inquiring from settlers who have lived on the Mississippi for 25 or 30 years, Rains found that it was their opinion that flood in this area was highly improbable.

"The levee can stand another 20 feet. And the crest, which will be due today or tomorrow, will not

rise more than 1 or 2 feet," declared Rains.

Government engineers predicted that the lower Mississippi valley will escape the flood menace even though the Mississippi in the St. Louis area has reached stages exceeding all records since 1644, reported the McGehee Times.

Six hundred troops from Camp Claiborne, Alexandria, La., are assisting civilians in nearby Dumas since Sunday. They are maintaining day and night patrols along the levees near Dumas, repairing levees and sand-bagging boils.

CHARGES MADE TO VISITORS

All visiting Japanese Americans, including members of the armed forces, will be charged subsistence and lodging fees according to a recent revision of WRA Instruction No. 61.

The original instructions applied only to visiting servicemen.

A charge of 20 cents per meal and 20 cents per night, if living quarters are furnished expressly for these visitors, will be made. However, if they stay with relatives or friends there will be no room charges.

These regulations do not apply to visiting evacuees from other centers.

ADVICE ON HEAT PROSTRATION

As precautionary measures against probable heat prostration which may occur in the coming summer months, Dr. Wayne Ramsey, chief medical officer, issued the following instructions.

"The drinking of small amounts of table salt in a glass of water 3 or 4 times a day during extremely hot weather may prevent heat prostration.

"Heat prostration may occur from prolonged exposure to high temperature. The two types of heat prostration are heat exhaustion and heat stroke (commonly

RESIDENTS TO SIGN-UP FOR FIRST AID CLASSES

In order that a representative from the national headquarters may be called to conduct a two-week first aid instructors' training course here, the Rohwer Red Cross chapter urges at least 15 Center residents to sign up at the local office in Ad building 2.

No previous first aid experience will be required to take the 30-hour course which will cover first aid technique, skill, procedure and training methods.

"The individual suffering from heat exhaustion complains of weakness and dizziness, sweats profusely, is pale, and feels cold. The treatment of heat exhaustion usually calls only for rest in a cool place.

"The onset of heat stroke is often quite sudden. The face is flushed, the skin dry and hot. The individual suffering from sun stroke should be taken at once to a cool place and cold water and ice applied immediately to reduce the temperature."
