SIGN UP FOR SKILLED LABOR

Evacuees who are interested in outside employ-ment not covered by job offers received at the Project are urged by the Relocation Authority to discuss their situations with a representative of the Project employment office, especially where they have specialized skills or professions. It may be possible to refer their applications for special placement effort by field relocation officers in the cities where employment is desired.

Job offers received at the Project are not altogether indicative of actually employment opportunities for evacuees, especially in the less common trades and professions. Reloca-(Continued on page 2)

TRANSFER CLARIFIED

Personal Transfers Between Centers To Be At Own Cost

Any Center resident who wishes to move to another project in order to be married or for other personal reasons ordinarily will have to bear the costs of travel himself, according to a new ruling received at Rohwer this week.

Administration sources pointed out that this does not in any way change existing regulations but simply clarifies a point on which there has been some question. It covers only those cases where the transfer request is initiated by the evacuee.

The Project Director will continue to authorize payment of travel expenses in cases where the transfer

has been recommended by the Welfare section. A transfor at government cost ordinarily will be recommended to unite members of an immediate family who were suparated during evacuation or to unito members of a broader family group who were socially or economically dependent upon each other at the time of evacuation.

Wherever WRA initiates a request for transfer, as in the case of professional persons whose services are needed at another center, the government will pay for the move.

While WRA in general discourages transfers between centers because of wartime civilian travel limitations, (Continued on page 2)

ADVICE ON CHIGGERS

With many outdoor workers suffering from chigger bites, Dr. Wayne Ramsey, Chief medical officer, answers the many inquiries made by residents as to effects from bites,

Chiggers are minute ovalshaped rod parasites which hibernate on woody decaying substances and occur in great numbers in the grass and brushes, in the fields and in moist swampy places.

The chigger attacks exposed parts of the body, usually the legs, and will cause intense itching for a few days. The bite of the chigger is annoying, but otherwise harmless, stated Dr. Ramsey.

A warm soap bath after exposure will usually rid the skin of the parasites and the application of witch hazel ointmont will often allay the itching, was the advice given by Dr. Ramsey.

These Maltby's typify the true friends of the Japanese, issei and nisei alike.

In spite of the unfavorable articles and stories that residents see and hear, friends like the Maltby's rebuild our morale and faith. To mar their trust in us would mean that we failed in doing our share.

Let's not let them down. The following is an excerpt:

"....I wish you would tell your camp newspaper that we 'The Maltby's' (myself, wife and three children) are going to decorate all of the graves of the Japanose dead in Evergreen Cemetery again this year. We will decorate all those graves where burials have been made in the last 15 or 20 years at least and will place flowers at the Pioneer Monument and the other big 'prefecture' monument. They will all be treated alike. We can't put too many at each one but they will each have a floral remembrance. We do this in memory of a lot of fine folks who are in an unfortunate situation and who can not do these honors in person.

"Our admiration and deep respect for you Japanese-Americans and Japanese have not changed one iota because of war conditions. We thought of you while you were here as good people and to us now you are still just as good and true as ever.

TEACHERS NEEDED

J. A. Trice, superintendent of education, calls the attention of the Center residents to the shortage of teachers in the Rohwer schools, particularly for next year. The WRA has frozen the number of Caucasian teachers to 56, the present number.

Sixty-one evacuee teachers are now in our schools, from which number many are planning to leave for colleges to finish their education.

The schools are faced with two alternatives. The first is to carry on next year with a reduced number of teachers. This will mean very large classes, perhaps, too large to allow the schools to be accredited. To avoid this, Conter residents who are qualified and who are willing to take some teacher training must fill the places of the evacuee teachers relocating now.

There is an immediate need for elementary teachers and instructors in science, agriculture, typing, art, shop and mathematics. Instructors in many other subjects will be needed next fall. Persons interested in teaching, or parents who have any names of prospective teachers should make applications to Dr. Mildred Silver in 31-1-D as soon as possible.


