

# RESULTS OF COUNCIL ELECTION

## MARCH CLOTHING GRANTS TO BE PAID BY CHECKS

Beginning with the March clothing allowances, payments will be made by check instead of cash.

Checks will be issued by the Regional Disbursing office, Kansas City, Mo., and mailed directly to individuals in the Center.

The preparation of March clothing allowances have been completed and payment vouchers have been sent to the Regional Disbursing office. Checks for residents are expected to arrive by June 12.

They may be cashed at the Co-op stores and the exchange cost for any one check cannot exceed five cents. As an added service to the residents, these checks will be accepted at the post office for money orders, war savings bonds and other services.

Due to this change in procedure of payment all Center residents are especially requested to notify the Welfare Section of any changes in barrack address. Should any checks be sent to wrong addresses, it is requested they be returned to the post office immediately.

Residents leaving the Center after payment orders are sent in are requested to notify the post office of forwarding addresses. The post office will forward checks to the new address. Checks will be issued only to the payees to whom they are addressed.

## SOLVE PLANS FOR MEDICOS

Concerning the local situation on doctors, Ray D. Johnston, Project Director, announced "preliminary arrangements are being worked out between the Public Health Service and the WRA."

If completion of plans does not materialize or is too slow, there will be an equalization of the medical staff in all the Centers according to their population and need.

## SEGREGATION NOT DEFINITE

When asked about the possibilities of segregating the loyal and the disloyal, Project Director Ray D. Johnston stated, "No definite segregation program has been decided upon at this time. However, the segregation problem is being considered on a national basis by the War Relocation Authority and in my opinion some program of this kind is going to be necessary, since all of the centers have people who show a definite preference for returning to Japan or who indicate loyalty to that country."

## FIRST AID UNIT SET FOR FARM

Negotiations are now being made by the local Red Cross Home and Farm Accident Prevention committee headed by Art Hicaka to provide a mobile First Aid station on the Center farm.

Shigeki Higashi and Jimmy Ishida were selected on the committee which is also making a survey of the accidents which have occurred on the local farm.

It was also reported that with Higashi as instructor, the first standard course in First Aid will start Monday for 49 men of the internal security staff from 3 to 5 p.m. every other day in PS hall 28.

One will be held in English on the usual Thursday evenings.

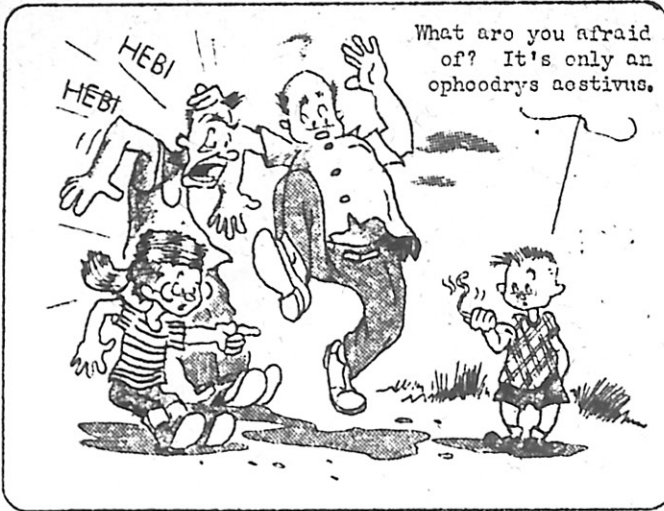
The additional one which will be in Japanese will be held on Tuesdays.

## LIVING COSTS OF EVACUEES COMPARED

"It isn't so much what you earn, it's more how you spend it that determines whether or not the 'high cost of living' is an obstacle to successful relocation". That was the conclusion of the Advisory Committee for Evacuees, 189 W. Madison St., Chicago, Ill., based on experiences of approximately 300 more evacuees relocated in the Chicago area during April.

Over 95 per cent of the evacuees have located satisfactory employment and are making successful readjustments, indicated the report from Edwin C. Morgenroth, executive secretary. Living costs of a cross-

section of evacuees as compiled by the Committee are given in a few examples below.

"A" is a young man, single, who relocated two months ago. He works in a factory, unskilled labor, earning an average of \$33 a week. He lives at a hotel, eats all meals 'out'; after transportation, laundry, recreation and miscellaneous items, he saved \$22 his first month. Last month moving into a housekeeping apartment with a friend where they cooked meals and packed lunches, he saved \$35.

"B" is married and both are working as domestics.

Together they receive \$130 monthly plus room with private bath, and board. "We gave about \$100 monthly." Both are not too sure they like the work better than anything else they might be doing, but they want to save as much as possible now. Their employers are satisfied with them.

"C" is married and has a baby. He earns \$165 monthly in a manufacturing plant. They pay \$45 for a nice apartment, "a little steep on my salary," but after skillful budgeting on other expenses, buying \$25 war bond monthly and \$6 insurance, he has about \$10 left.
