NING PROGRAM SHELVED

FAIR EMPLOYMENT PRACTICE ORDER No. 9346 ISSUED

Executive Order No. 9346, which will take "the Fair Employment Practice Committee out from under the War Manpower Commission and reconstitute it as an independent federal agency," was signed on May 28 President Roosevelt.

The order is one of the measures being taken by the government "to eliminate discrimination in regard to hire, tenure, terms or conditions of employment or union membership because of race, creed, color or national origin." It states that the elimination of racial discrimination is the duty of all employers and labor organizations.

The mass evacuation of Japanese from the West coast out short many brilliant sports careers of nisei athletes. It seems that just when the nisei were hitting the sports pages of the big dailies, this catastrophe hit them, and hit 'em hard it did.

Most sports fans will remember Homicide Hal Hoshino, the Pendleton, Ore., sensation. He was boxing called the hardest hitting fighter in the featherweight division and he lived up to those words by kayoing such top-notch leatherslingers as Lou Salica, Black Joe, George Hansford and many others.

Just before the war broke out, Hal came down to Los Angelos to win fame and maybe a chance for a shot at the crown. His first bout was with Jimmy Florita, a slugging Filipino, and it turned out to be his last. A heavy favorito to win, Hoshino was knocked cool in the first minute of the initial round with a surprise punch.

Most boxing exports still figure that Hoshino was a better man with his past, star-studded record, so Hal's manager asked for a rematch. But along came Dec. 7 and that smashed Hoshino's chance for a comeback, which I'm sure would have been successful.

Jockey Joe Kabuki's career is similar to Hal Hoshino's. Joo was one of the bost jookey prospects on the coast, riding at Agua Caliente and Tanforan. Riding winners was becoming a habit to him when tho war cut his short, but brilliant career.

Tak Kohayashi and Art Kaihatsu of UCLA, Dave Komatsu of USF, Aki Shiraishi of Occidental college and Ken Uyesugi of Southern California are some of the many nisei athletes whose careers were jolted by the mass evacuation.

Let's hope that after the war, misei athletes will bring nisei names back on the sports pages.
