

ROHWER HIGH GETS "A" RATING

Rated By State Superintendent

According to the letter just received by the school superintendent's office, Rohwer Center high school has received its "A" rating.

It is considered an honor to get an "A" rating

during the first year of the school's establishment.

In a letter to J. A. Trice, superintendent, from Dr. M. R. Owens, Arkansas State high school supervisor, Owens states, "In a conference with W. F. Hall, State supervisor of elementary schools, we agreed that in view of the fact that your high school is

a new institution with its students drawn from well-established high schools on the West coast, the class 'A' rating could be assigned without waiting for final rating on the elementary schools.

"I want to congratulate the principals, teachers and pupils on this achievement, because it is due largely to their planning, teaching and cooperation. I also want to express appreciation especially to the Project Director, chief of Community Services, procurement section and all other Project personnel who have contributed to progressive operation of the schools."

In commenting on the "A" rating, Trice said, "Wherever the students may go, this rating assures acceptance of their high school credits earned here. Although this represents the

The administration earnestly solicits continued co-operation of the entire Center in school affairs."

SIX BRANCH H.S. LIBRARIES

In addition to the two main libraries in the school system, there are 6 branch libraries. The collection in Dr. Mildred Silver's office, 31-1-D, of approximately 150 books, is on professions and psychology. Helen Frasier has about 15 books on professions, which are loaned out to faculty members only.

The adult education department has a "quiet haven" at 31-2-C. Besides 35 books on family relations, religion and several other topics, there are many good magazines.

Ira Holland, health and education adviser, has 2 libraries. One is at Block 35 and the other at 31. In Block 35 there are approximately 145 books and many pamphlets on health and physical education. The supplementary library in Block 31 has about 30 pamphlets.

Opal Albright of 35-12-C has about 15 books on vocational guidance. She also has catalogs and bulletins of various colleges.

タウソンセンドの言に依ると暴動の起つた理由にはWR日軍捕引演習

インディアンサービスが責任を負はなかつたからとある。暴動は白人を除いてしまふやうな大規模なものとなつた。各部門の支配者は道をへだてて銅幣鉄錠で待機してゐたが中に入る権利を有せぬ軍警に入所領證を預けなかつた。日本人は勿論彼等が恐れたものと信じてゐた。
