## JOB LAYOFF SOON

The following preliminary instructions reducing project employment to approximately 2800 employees by September 30 have just been received from Washington by Project Director Ray D. Johnston.

The change in procedure, the notice states, is necessary and advisable due to the limited budget and also due to the fact that plenty of jobs are now a-

available for those who desire employment outside of the Center.

"A forthcoming administrative instruction on project employment to be effective July 1, established employment quota for each project on basis of maximum number of employees necessary to perform essential tasks," the notice stated.

"Studies indicate Rohwer maximum for project opera-

tions including subsistence production and community enterprises will be approximately 2800 employees. Not more than ten per cent of employees may be classified at \$19. Budget allocation will be made accordingly.

"...Project directors will be allowed three months beginning July 1 to come within quotas...Allocation of first quarter funds will contemplate achieving one-third of any necessary reduction of force by July 31 and quota limit by September 30."

The instructions continue, "Normal outlet for persons desiring employment is relocation and WRA will furnish project employment only to such persons as are genuinely needed for essential project operations. --Dillon S. Myer, WRA"

Project Director Johnston requested that all divisions and sections cooperate in carrying out the provisions of this instruction. Additional details will be furnished as soon as they are received.

### TRAVEL GRANTS' CLARIFICATION

In clarifying the misinterpretations concerning the temporary stoppage of travel and assistance grants to those relocating from this Center, E. B. Moulton, Employment division head, stated:

"Until funds are available from the 1943-44 appropriation, it has been necessary to suspend travel grants for those relocating.

"The Administrative instruction covering such grants has not been changed and, therefore, it is anticipated that grants will be resumed in the near future," Moulton added.

Residents relocating are requested to follow the usual procedures in making applications for leave.

Don't forget to attend the open house on Friday July 9. It is to be one of the most important events of the entire Rohwer Center school system. Both parents and friends are invited to come. J. A. Trice, superintendent of the local schools emphasized that "The success of the open house depends upon the presence of everybody."

## TAX PAYERS ON RUMPL PLAN NOW

After July 1, most wage earners in the United States will pay Federal income taxes on a "pay as you go" basis in accordance with a recent Act of Congress. On all money earned each week employers will deduct 20 per cent for taxes after allowances for personal and dependent exemptions have been made.

Agricultural workers and persons employed in domestic service in a private home are not subject to the wage deductions. This does not excuse them from paying the income taxes. They are required to file an income tax return as in the past.
